Snowstorm Tree Limb Drop Off

Do you have fallen tree limbs from last night's snowstorm? If you have a lot of fallen tree limbs you are trying to dispose of, please feel free to drop them off at Little Salt Wash Park.

- Little Salt Wash Park overflow parking
- Free to the community!

You might see our Public Works and Parks crews out clearing tree limbs. Due to the amount of tree limbs down, we are opening the Little Salt Wash Park overflow parking as a tree limb drop off location. Our crews will be dropping off tree limbs in this location. If you have a lot of fallen tree limbs you are trying to dispose of, please feel free to drop them off as well! Stay safe, Fruita!

Trail Closure at the Little Salt Wash Trail under I-70 Starting November 14, 2022

Starting on Monday, November 14, 2022, the Colorado Department of Transportation (CDOT) will be closing a section of the Little Salt Wash Trail under I-70 to perform structural maintenance. With the Little Salt Wash stream running near the I-70 bridge, fast-moving water can remove sediment from around the bridge abutments. When this happens, the structure can be compromised and affect the structural integrity. There are scour holes at both the Little Salt Wash and Big Salt Wash bridges for I-70. So, CDOT will be making repairs to both crossings which will result in a closure of the Lower Little Salt Wash Trail. CDOT anticipates the closure to last five months and is working on a detour route. Access from the north to the Kokopelli section of the Colorado Riverfront Trail will remain open. CDOT will be sharing more information about the project and detour route next week. Once we have more information, we will make sure to share with the community through our various communication channels.

Leaf Pick Up for Waste Management Pilot Areas

To help residents in the Waste Management pilot program dispose of fallen leaves, during the week of November 7, 2022, residents can place extra bags of leaves next to their trash can for pick up. Waste Management will pick up extra bags of leaves on your normal pick-up day (depending on volume, they may have to finish the following day).

- Leaves must be bagged.
- Bags must be 3 feet away from your trash cart.
- Only bags of leaves will be picked up.

In August 2022, residents in the pilot program received a 96-gallon cart. If you are unsure if you are a part of the Waste Management pilot program, please review the <u>pilot program maps</u>.


New Parks & Rec Registration Software

Update on North Fruita Desert Trail Work

Since last spring, eight miles of new trails have been added to the 18 Road Trail system. Crews from the Mesa County Trail Team and the Western Colorado Conservation Corps have been working hard over the past several months to create multiple reroutes, new routes, and trail extensions. By the end of the year, the teams anticipate adding an additional three to five miles of new trails. The City of Fruita on behalf of the Fruita Trails Initiative (FTI) received a grant from Great Outdoors Colorado as well as a grant from the Colorado Tourism Office to help fund these new trails. The FTI is excited to continue implementing the North Fruita Desert Master Plan. View a map of the 18 Road Trail system with the new routes highlighted in pink.

Public Works

- **Building Maintenance Update.** The fire inspection for the Chamber of Commerce was completed. A door and HVAC unit were repaired at the Civic Center. A painting project was completed at the Public Works shop.
- **Fleet Maintenance Update.** A fuel shut-off solenoid was replaced on a mower for Parks. Wiring was repaired on the crack sealer. A police vehicle was serviced.
- **Road Maintenance Update.** Two asphalt patches were completed on Drumlin Circle. Storm drain inlets were cleaned. Mag tanks were repaired and installed for upcoming snow removal. Dirt was hauled to the Bike Park for the Parks department.
- *Utilities Update.* Staff are rebuilding a fan at the I-70 lift station. Sewer tap locations and reporting are currently being updated. 108 utility locates were completed. Troy Melroy passed his Wastewater Collection I test. Great job and congratulations, Troy!
- Wastewater Treatment Update. Staff pumped the ATAD (Autothermal Thermophilic Aerobic Digestion) tank solids from tank #1 to tank #2 to allow for the operation of both Rotary Drum Thickeners and for inspection. Tank #1 was serviced and cleaned. With the swap of tanks, it took four days to recover solid temperatures. Blower belts were replaced on one of the Solids Building HVAC units. A couple of faults with HVAC units relating to heating units were worked through.
