Tuesday's City Council Meeting

We have a bit of a light meeting scheduled for Tuesday night. There are no public hearings scheduled or any items on the Proclamations or Presentations portion of the agenda. After the consent agenda, staff will share a presentation and overview on a new engagement campaign called, For the Love Fruita, and then the Council will adjourn into Executive Session for the City Manager's formal review. See you all Tuesday night!

North Mulberry Street Outdoor Plaza

Bids for the construction of the North Mulberry Street Outdoor Plaza closed last week and Professional Pipeline and Concrete, Inc. was awarded the contract. The total project cost is within budget at \$449,925. This includes construction/installation of the hardscape improvements for \$335,315 (drainage, gas lines, electricity, irrigation lines, planters, parking spaces, brick base, etc.) and \$70,000 for contingencies and amenities (seating, fire pits, etc.). The cost of the purchase of the shade sails is \$44, 610 (installation is part of the \$335,315). Artwork will be covered by the Arts & Culture Board art program and we will seek opportunities for amenities from local artisans that will have an artistic functional use. Mobilization is planned to begin the week of December 26 and construction is anticipated to last until late April/early May of 2023. Water Damage to FCC Basketball Courts

The Fruita Community Center received extensive water damage to the east end of the gymnasium that will require at least 5,500 square feet of flooring to be replaced. The removal of the damaged flooring is scheduled for the week of December 19th. The gymnasium will be fully closed during this time. Staff is currently working on a replacement plan with insurance and trying to select a contractor to replace the flooring. Staff will provide progress updates as information becomes available. Fruita City Council Adopts 2023 Municipal Budget (Continued)

On December 6, 2022, the Fruita City Council adopted the 2023 Municipal Budget including \$27.3 million in projected revenues (excluding transfers from other funds and other financing sources), and \$30 million in proposed expenditures between all funds. The City of Fruita's annual budget mirrors the priorities outlined in the Fruita Strategic Plan while also providing essential core services and aligning with the City's core values. The City's Strategic Plan identifies specific goals and projects to improve the quality of life and place for Fruita residents for the next several years.

The planning documents that guide Fruita City Council and staff's decision-making for each budget year is the reflection of an extensive amount of community input from Fruita residents. We are proud of the input our community provides us to help guide decision-making that aligns with the community's values. View the full news release online or with the attached document. - Question: When there is snowfall, what streets does the City's streets crew plow?
- **Answer:** The City streets crew will plow all main roads in Fruita, public parking lots, and roads leading to emergency services and schools.

General Updates

• Financial Reports. Financial reports for October 2022 are now available and can be found in the packet for next week's City Council meeting. Quick overview of the reports, when compared to October 2021, most tax revenues continue to trend higher. City sales tax collections were up 14% in October and are trending at an increase of 10% for the year. Use tax on motor vehicles was slightly up in the October (up 1%, trending at an increase of 1% overall), the City's lodging tax increased 53% (trending at an increase of 7% overall), and County sales tax collections were

- also up 5% (trending at an increase of 9%). Use taxes on building materials were down 8% in October 2022 but are still up 37% when compared to 2022.
- *City Link.* The winter edition of the Fruita City Link will be mailed to Fruita residents within the next week. An <u>online version</u> of the newsletter can be found online at <u>fruita.org/communications</u>.
- Food Bank of the Rockies Distribution Center Ribbon Cutting. On Wednesday night, I had the opportunity to attend the ribbon cutting of the new distribution center for the Western Slope Food Bank of the Rockies. The new distribution center is a beautiful facility and is going to be a great addition to all the communities throughout the Western Slope. Thank you to the Western Slope Food Bank of the Rockies for all of your work for our community and others, and our ongoing partnership.
- **City Engagement Event**. We hosted our last City Engagement Event of the year on Wednesday afternoon at Starbucks. We had a great turnout and talked about the recent budget adoption, project highlights, and answered a few questions from residents about fire mitigation and grocery stores.
- CPW Draft Wolf Restoration and Management Plan. Colorado Parks and Wildlife is looking for
 public feedback on the draft Wolf Restoration and Management Plan online and at one of the
 five upcoming public meetings. The plan looks at reintroducing 30 to 50 wolves in total over the

Police Department

• **Shop with a Cop.** Several of our officers had a great time participating in Shop with a Cop activities with Fruita-area elementary school students. This is always a fun experience for the kids and cops alike and leaves everyone with smiles on their faces.

Public Works

• **Compliance Testing.** Wastewater Treatment staff sampled/tested the Colorado River to complete Regulation 85 compliance testing. Regulation 85 currently regulates point sources of nutrient discharge such as wastewater treatment plants and regulates nitrogen, phosphorus, and chlorophyll in Colorado's surface waters.

- **Utility Locates.** 33 utility locates were completed bringing the total number of locates for the year to 1,707.
- **FOGs Removal.** Utility staff removed 1,500 gallons of grease from the collection system for disposal.
- **Welcome Kevin!** The Public Works Department filled a Maintenance Worker I position in the Utilities Division Kevin Delong, who has been working in the Utilities Division as a part-time employee accepted the full-time position. Congratulations Kevin!
- **H2S Project Update.** The city's Construction Manager at Risk (CMAR) and Engineering firm were on site this week to walk the project, discuss bypass pumping plan, review biofilter and manhole material and discuss the aeration project.
- **Streets Division**. The Public Works Streets Division completed a culvert replacement project on Kingsview Road.
