
#### THEODORE (TREY) DOWNEY III

## Gearing up for Irrigation

Irrigation water is typically turned into the canals around the first of April and crews will be working to get the City's irrigation systems up and running as soon as possible. To assist in the startup of irrigation season, residents are reminded to make sure ditches are cleaned and valves (that were used to drain pumps and irrigation systems for winter) are closed prior to April 1st.

Each residence that receives irrigation water from the City's system should have two valves. One above ground (resident's valve) and one underground (the City valve). Please do not use the City valve to turn your system on and off. We use this valve as an emergency shut off valve if you have a problem with your valve or system. If you're having a water supply problem, first check

to see that your supply valve (the valve above ground) is open and that your filter isn't plugged. If it seems that your neighbors have water and you don't or no one in the neighborhood has water, call your irrigation water supplier.


Please keep in mind that most newer subdivisions are not connected to the City's irrigation system and are supplied water through their Homeowners Association. Residents are encouraged to make sure they know who to contact with questions about their irrigation systems, especially in an emergency situation. The figure below provides some guidance on who to contact. If your irrigation provider is unknown, please feel free to call the City for clarification.

The City would like to keep updated

contact information for HOAs in the event of an irrigation issue or emergency. Please email HOA contact information to the City of Fruita Public Works Department at adownie@fruita.org or call (970)858-9558. This will help us communicate important information as it pertains to the irrigation system.

Once irrigation water is available, residents are encouraged to help conserve water where they can is recommended. Following an alternating watering schedule. EVEN house numbers water Tuesday, Thursday, and/or Saturday. ODD house numbers water Wednesday, Friday, and/or Sunday. The City performs routine flushing and maintenance of the irrigation systems on Mondays. ©
