## **Monday's Special City Council Meeting**

As a reminder, we have two special meetings scheduled for next week. For our first meeting, on Monday night, we have three agenda items to cover on the Mountain Water properties. The first agenda item is to review the one offer we received for the purchase of Enoch's Lake. The second item, we will review the results of the NRCS Report (Natural Resources Conservation Service) on the properties, and also the Reservoir #2 breaching information. The third item is to review for possible approval or feedback of the Fruita Mountain Properties Resolution.

Our second meeting next week is a joint meeting with the Planning Commission on Tuesday night. Our special counsel, Butler Snow, will provide both groups with general information on steps and funding mechanisms for Public/Private partnerships. - Rural Philanthropy Meeting. Thursday morning, Neighborhood Services Coordinator Matt
  Carson and Communications and Engagement Specialist Ciara DePinto attended the first
  Rural Philanthropy Days (RPD) committee meeting. RPD is a conference coming to Fruita in
  June 2024 focused on connecting nonprofits with funders. Fruita is the community host for
  2024 and we are excited to support the committee's efforts as they move forward in the
  planning process.

#### **Parks and Recreation**

- **Update on the FCC Indoor Pool.** On Friday evening, there was broken glass on the pool deck prior to closing. Our priority is to ensure the safety of all guests as well as the filtration and other mechanical systems that circulate the water. In compliance with the Colorado Model Aquatic Health Code staff drained and thoroughly cleaned the deck and pool. Staff worked as quickly as possible to reopen the pool. The pool reopened at 5:30 am today thanks to the efforts of aquatics and building maintenance staff.
- Rim Rock Run at the Fruita Community Center. The Fruita Community Center was the host site for packet pick up, the finish line, and post-event activities for the 2023 Rimrock Marathon and Half Marathon. The race had 375 runners, and it was a great event!
- Holiday Arts and Craft Fair at the Fruita Community Center December 9th. There were a
  total of 113 applications for the Holiday Arts and Craft Fair and there is space for 65
  vendors. Staff will be evaluating how we can expand the fair in the future to accommodate
  our growing need for the event.

- River Corridor Initiative. City staff participated in the River Corridor Initiative Planning
  Workshop designed to develop a coordinated approach to a shared vision, explore management
  strategies for the river corridor, inform the engagement process, and develop an agreed upon
  planning framework.
- **District 51 Long Range Planning.** Public Works Director participated in the second meeting with District 51 Long Range Planning Committee for facilities.
- **Fiber Internet Communication.** Public Works and Engineering staff met with Deeply Digital regarding concerns of conduit installation throughout the community. Changes are being made by Deeply Digital to better communicate what residents can expect during construction and cleanup.
- Wastewater Treatment Facility Projects. Wastewater Treatment Facility staff completed the transfer of flows from the north oxidation ditch to the south ditch and removed and cleaned a significant amount of grit from the basin to continue the work installing the new aeration grid system. Both the aeration project and the H2S mitigation project continue to move forward with expected completion in early December.
