Starting CPR and utilizing an AED before emergency medical services arrived was vital in this situation. Doctors said without the quick action performed, we wouldn't have this individual with us today. City of Fruita employee Jacob Atkins and United Rentals employees Shane Watson and Darren Thomason were recognized last night for their efforts by the City of Fruita Public Works Director, Lower Valley Fire District Fire Chief and Fire Marshal, and the Grand Junction Fire Department Fire Chief. These individuals from various backgrounds demonstrated extraordinary courage, quick thinking, and teamwork. We are extremely lucky to be surrounded by so many incredible individuals!

EV Fast Charging Stations Now Available

The new electrical vehicle charging stations are now available for use at the Fruita Civic Center! In 2022, the City of Fruita was awarded a grant from the Colorado Department of Transportation to install two fast charging stations for electrical vehicles. After many months of working with contractors for installation and activation, we are happy to have these available for the community and visitors. Users can generally charge their vehicles in less than an hour, as the two chargers have the ability to charge at around 400 miles per hour. These are the first two DC Level III Chargers in Fruita.

Weekly FAQ

In every weekly update, we will be answering one question we get asked often from the community. These questions will cover a variety of topics from all city departments. If you have any questions, you think would be valuable for us to share, let us know by emailing communications@fruita.org.

- Question: Can I have an Accessory Dwelling Unit (ADU) on my property?
- Answer: There are multiple variables to review to determine if a property can have an accessory dwelling unit (ADU). The first variable to be considered is what zoning area the property falls under. Accessory Dwelling Units (ADUs) are permitted on property with a single-family detached house in the following zones: Rural Estate (RE), Large Lot Residential (LLP), Community Residential (CR), South Fruita Residential (SFR), Monument Preservation (MP), Neighborhood Commerical Overlay, Downtown Mixed Use (DMU), and Commerical-1 (C-1). If you don't know what zoning district your property is located in, take a look at the City's GIS Map.. In the map's "Layer List," make sure the "Existing Zoning District" option is selected. In addition to meeting zoning requirements, an ADU must meet setback requirements, height requirements, and lot coverage requirements. Property owners looking to have an ADU need to know where

easements are on the property and follow HOA guidelines if in a neighborhood with an HOA. To learn more about ADUs in Fruita, visit our Community Development Department.

The program ended with a tour of the Wastewater Treatment Facility and an overview of the Community Development Department and Building Division. Participants will be recognized at the next City Council meeting on August 15, 2023, for graduating from the Fruita Academy!
- Welcome Kaydee! Our Communications Intern started this week, and we are so excited to
 welcome her! Kaydee is a senior at Colorado Mesa University pursuing a political science
 degree. This internship is being funded by the Mesa County Workforce Center and will run for
 the next few months.

- **Fire Mitigation Project.** This week, in collaboration with the Lower Valley Fire District and Upper Colorado River Interagency Fire Management, crews worked along the Little Salt Wash Trail in the Creekside Subdivision to remove overgrown vegetation to help with fire mitigation.
- Tour with Congresswoman Boebert. On Thursday, Mayor Kincaid, Mayor Pro Tem Breman, Shannon, and I met with Representative Boebert and her staff to provide an overview of the Fruita Strategic Plan and our current and future priority projects. We also gave Representative Boebert a tour of Fruita and showed her a few of our recent successes throughout the city. We had a great discussion and also discussed the Congressional Directed Spending process and how we can prepare for those next year.
- Mesa County Joint Information Center Meeting. Communications and Engagement Specialist
 Ciara DePinto, and Police Lieutenant Nick Peck attended the monthly Mesa County JIC meeting.
 These meetings are composed of agencies throughout the valley, including the Mesa County
 Health, Sheriff's Office, Grand Junction Police and Fire, Lower Valley Fire, School District 51, and
 more. The group discussed future training opportunities for the group and started working on a
 communications campaign for Suicide Prevention Month in September.

Administration

Engineering

• Pine Street Bridge. GA Western returned to the site and completed work on erosion control measures by placing rock riprap at the outfall of irrigation drainage pipes. A riprap channel was completed on the north side of the wash where Xcel had located their temporary bypass pipeline during the construction of the bridge. Xcel had a power linemen crew remove the last remaining power pole after the telecommunication companies completed their work. Ben Dowd Construction had a crew that excavated the disturbed roadway area to subgrade elevation 22" below the proposed finished grade. The subgrade was recompacted, and 17" of base course material was installed and compacted. Gonzales Construction is scheduled to begin work on the guardrails on Monday, August 7.



Parks and Recreation

- Drinking fountain at Circle Park repaired. The drinking fountain at Circle Park was repaired
 earlier this week. The plumbing contractor found two curb stop valves that were rusted out,
 causing the leak. They were able to make the repairs and turn the fountain back on. There is
 another drinking fountain at Reed Park that is currently off as they wait for parts to repair.
- July Fruita Community Center (FCC) Visitors. In July, the FCC saw 21,071 visits compared to 19,420 visits last July. Of the 21,071 visits, 9,255 visits were a one-time day-use visit.
- Fall Registration and Activity Guide. Fall registration and the Activity Guide became available on Tuesday, August 1. On top of the programming staples in youth and adult sports, fitness, and aquatics, new Adult 55+ activities were added, expanding our Recreation portfolio. The community can now sign up for fall activities, including aquatics, fall sports, and more. Check out the guide online or at the front desk at the Fruita Community Center.

- **Front Desk Concessions.** Concessions at the front desk continue to grow and have become a cornerstone of front desk operations. July retail and concessions sales totaled \$6,600.
- **New Faces at the FCC.** Several new staff joined the FCC team at the front desk, RecRats, within fitness, and with facility maintenance. Welcome to the team!

Police Department

Public Works

- **Chipseal Project.** Crews will continue sweeping the chipsealed roads to pick up loose chips in preparation for the final fog coat seal that is scheduled for the week of August 21st.
- **H2S Project.** The first shipment of fiberglass manholes was delivered on Thursday. Hensel Phelps staff were on site to meet with sub-contractors to discuss the project. Additional manholes are expected towards the end of the month with project expected to begin early September.
- *Utilities.* Utility staff completed 41 locates this week and continued with irrigation monitoring and headgate cleaning. Staff also continued with sewer line cleaning, lift station inspections, and CCTV software training.
- **WWRF Tour.** Utility staff and Wastewater Treatment Staff gave a tour of the Wastewater Reclamation Facility to the Fruita Acadamy participants. Staff also met with Hensel Phelps and Rain for Rent to discuss H2S project.
- Water Quality Meeting. Public Works Director attended a Colorado Department of Public Health & Environment Water Quality meeting to discuss Water Quality Fees.
- **FOGs Collaboration.** Public Works, Community Development, and Building Division staff met to discuss the Fats-Oils-Grease program.
- **Pavement Assessment.** Preliminary data has been received from the pavement assessment project, and Public Works staff and Engineering staff met to review the data in preparation for a meeting to discuss treatment options.
- **Growing Water Smart Application.** Public Works Director submitted a City of Fruita application for the Growing Water Smart Workshop. This workshop utilizes a range of public engagement, planning, communication, and policy implementation tools to help community teams realize their water efficiency, watershed health, and water resilience goals.
