Tuesday's City Council Workshop

Tuesday night's City Council meeting will begin with a discussion with the Historic Preservation Board and the Fruita Tourism Advisory Board. We will then review the City Charter and discuss the CML Conference from last month. See you on Tuesday!

City Council Meeting Recap – July 18, 2023

The second reading for the Ordinance regarding Enoch Lake was held this past Tuesday. During the regular City Council meeting on July 18, 2023, the agenda consisted of the second reading for Ordinance 2023-07, Ordinance 2023-08, and Ordinance 2023-09. Each ordinance went through the public hearing process, and Fruita City Council listened to every public comment received about each ordinance. After public comment and discussion, the Fruita City Council decided to continue the public hearing for Ordinance 2023-07 (Enoch Lake) and Ordinance 2023-08 (2 Acre Parcel on Pinon Mesa) until the meeting scheduled on Tuesday, August 29, 2023. The Fruita City Council decided to continue the hearing to allow more time to receive community feedback. The Fruita City Council did approve Ordinance 2023-09, an Ordinance authorizing the conveyance of real property of the City referred to as 4.05-Acre Parcel located on Pinon Mesa. The approval of Ordinance 2023-09 moved forward the sale of the 4.05-acre parcel, which has no water rights and is completely surrounded by private property. Chipseal Project Starts Monday

Starting next week, the city will begin the chip sealing project in coordination with Mesa County. The community can expect a few minor traffic inconveniences. For example, minor amounts of dust, loose gravel, and one-way traffic during the operation. We recommend traveling at a reduced speed until all the loose gravel has been removed from the roadway. City maintenance crews will sweep excess gravel

off the road in one to two working days. In approximately one week, the road will again have the texture of a paved road.

Crews will begin work on the north side of I-70 first, and work will continue for two weeks. After the north side of I-70 is complete, crews will begin the process on the south side of I-70. Stage 1 Fire Restrictions Beginning Today

Starting today, Mesa County has entered into a stage 1 fire restriction. In a stage 1 fire restriction, the following is prohibited for use: personal fireworks, campfires outside of fire pits or rings, agricultural issued burning without a burn permit from the Mesa County Sheriff, use of explosive targets, smoking outside near combustible materials, operating a chainsaw without a spark-arresting device, Welding or operating acetylene or other torch with open flame except in cleared areas of at least 10 feet in diameter and in possession of an unexpired chemical pressurized fire extinguisher. - Question: Does the City of Fruita offer any volunteer programs?
- Answer: Yes! If residents are interested, the City of Fruita offers a few ways for residents to volunteer around town. The City of Fruita has an Adopt a Street/Trail program, where residents or groups can sign up to adopt a short section of a trail or road and clean it up two to four times a year. The City provides all materials needed for the clean ups, including vests, gloves, trash bags, and also picks up the trash once bagged. This program was launched last year, and seven sections have already been adopted. Additionally, our Parks and Recreation Department hosts a Trail Host program, where residents can volunteer to be trail hosts along the Co. Riverfront Trail and other regional trails. General Updates

- *Financial Reports.* The Financial Reports for May 2023 were included in the packet for the July 18, 2023, meeting. The full report can be found here, but below is a summary:
 - City Sales Taxes Sales tax collections were up 7% in May of 2023 when compared to the prior year and is trending at a 9% increase year-to-date.
 - Use Taxes on Motor Vehicles Decrease of 14% in May, trending at a decrease of 6% overall when compared to 2022.
 - Use Taxes on Building Materials Was down 45% in May 2023, year-to-date is a decrease of 27%.
 - Lodging Tax The City's lodging tax decreased 12% compared to the previous May, trending at a decrease of 3% overall.
 - County Sales Tax Increased 2%, year-to-date is at a 1% increase.
- week that started with a tour of the Fruita Community Center on Wednesday. The group was able to see and hear about the services offered at the facility. The most interesting part of the tour was definitely the pump room, where the mechanics for the pool are managed. Thank you to Tina Ross (FCC Supervisor) and Marc Mancuso (Parks and Recreation Director) for the great tours! On Thursday, the group met back at the Fruita Civic Center for regular class. Class started with Chief Krouse and Lieutenant Peck from the Fruita Police Department and ended with Marc Mancuso from the Parks and Recreation Department. Next week, the class will hear about Engineering and Public Works.



City Engagement Event Recap. We had a fantastic turnout at this month's engagement event.
The event focused on our strategic outcome of Fruita's lifestyle. Parks and Recreation Director
Marc Mancuso joined me for this event to share parks and recreation projects that fall under
the lifestyle value. The group also discussed opportunities at the old Fruita Lagoons property,
short-term rentals, and composting. Join us at our next event on August 17 at 5 p.m. in Civic

- Colorado Tourism Office Panel Discussion. On Wednesday, I spoke on a panel for the Colorado Tourism Office's Leadership Journey event. The panel discussion focused on Fruita's tourism partnership with Palisade and how we collaborate on joint marketing efforts. We have worked with Palisade on multiple projects including the recent completion of the Gravel Adventure Guide, created responsible messaging around recreation on public and private lands, and have developed many itineraries that promote both destinations. It is a great partnership, and we look forward to collaborating more with Palisade!
- Mesa County Weekend of Service and Understanding. HomewardBound, along with other community partners, are facilitating the Mesa County Weekend of Service & Understanding Friday, Aug. 4th and Saturday, Aug. 5th. Community members will come together for a series of events, including community service projects and courageous conversations around housing and people experiencing houselessness in Mesa County. Their goal is to bring the community together for greater connection and understanding, and it's a wonderful opportunity to learn more about houselessness and share your perspective. - Discover Fruita Podcast/Radio. On this week's episode of Discover Fruita, Lieutenant Nick Peck

 the Junior Citizen Police Academy, the upcoming Cops and Cars Show, and how to keep yourself

Administration

• IIJA and IRA Summit. On Wednesday, Assistant City Manager Shannon Vassen and Public Works Director Kimberly Bullen traveled to Rifle to attend a full-day summit on upcoming grant opportunities from the Infrastructure Investment Act ("IIJA") and the Inflation Reduction Act ("IRA"). The summit included speakers from most state agencies and a few federal departments, and focused on potential federal funding opportunities for road and bridge infrastructure, water and wastewater projects, broadband projects, energy, and more. The summit was hosted by the Co. Department of Economic Development and International Trade ("OEDIT"), and OEDIT staff estimate that the state of Colorado will receive \$7 billion between the two programs. Staff will evaluate potential IIJA and IRA grant opportunities and see if the

new programs align with projects in our strategic plan. The summit was also an opportunity to connect with our regional partners and discuss issues across Western Colorado.

Engineering

- 2023 Sidewalk Replacements. The City has a sidewalk replacement program that incentivizes replacing sidewalks that have tripping hazards and do not meet current ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act) standards. Staff has evaluated locations currently in the core of downtown this year and has \$100,000 budgeted for these replacements. Bidding for this project is slated to close on August 18, with various concrete replacements scheduled for construction this fall. Per the municipal code, the maintenance of sidewalks is considered the responsibility of the adjacent property owner. In an effort to soften that responsibility, the City has developed an 80/20 program where the property owner is responsible for 20% of the cost and the City takes on the other 80%.
- **Pine Street Bridge Update**. Xcel Power completed work for the permanent power lines across the Little Salt Wash on the west side of the new bridge. The work included trimming existing trees to ensure the safety of the new power lines. While it may appear the bridge is complete and ready to open, work still remains to complete this project, with several different contractors and subcontractors having to mobilize and demobilize. The work to complete the project includes the following steps:
 - Telecommunication companies and their subcontractors install their permanent facilities across the Little Salt Wash.
 - o Roadway and sidewalk excavation to subgrade
 - o Base coarse installation and compaction
 - o Guardrail Installation
 - Adjustment of storm drain inlets and manhole covers to finish grades
 - Finish grading of base coarse for sidewalk construction
 - Concrete sidewalk construction
 - Sandblasting the concrete deck
 - Application of two layers of epoxy coating and chips on the bridge deck
 - Finish grading of base coarse for roadway
 - Asphalt paving of the road
 - Striping the asphalt and bridge
 - o Project cleanup and demobilization

Many of the items remaining are specialized tasks with different contractors and subcontractors responsible for completing the work. That means coordination and logistics to schedule each group. There will be periods when it appears no work is being accomplished due to the completion of one task early one week and the subsequent contractor/subcontractor being scheduled to start the following week. The anticipated completion date for the project is mid-September. We appreciate the community's patience as we work to finish the final pieces.

Parks and Recreation

Youth Activities: DinoMites Summer Camp had a busy week. They had a guest speaker from
Colorado Parks and Wildlife come in and talk on Wednesday. They also took a walk to Dan
Williams Park. Camp is preparing to make the move from Shelledy to the FCC for the remainder
of summer since Shelledy needs the space back.

- Track and Field Camp ends Friday 21^{st.} The local fire station is bringing out a firetruck to have a water day with all the kids to celebrate the completion of camp. Challenger Soccer Camp is running this week with over 20 participants.
- **100 FCC Passes Purchased for Kids.** A YouTube Channel, Driver's Therapy, bought 100 Fruita Community Passes as part of a celebration on reaching 50,000 subscribers on YouTube. The YouTube Channel owner will be sharing the passes for free with kids in the community. It is always great to see businesses supporting the FCC!
- Aquatics closures this week. Our aquatics team has been working diligently to regulate the
 chemicals in the indoor pool and eliminate any closures. We have had some problems with the
 new chemical feeders that were installed in March and needed the contractor who installed
 them to complete warranty work on the system. The contractor was able to regulate the system
 and verify that the system was operating properly. Our goal is to keep the closures to a
 minimum and understand how the closures this week have negatively impacted daily workouts.
 Thanks for your understanding and look forward to seeing you at the pool.

Public Works

• *H2S Project.* The H2S project was set back to the first week of September.

- Reservoir #2 Update. On June 1, 2023, the Emergency Action Plan was activated at the lowest level for Fruita Reservoir Dam #2 due to an unplanned infilling of the reservoir. This reservoir has been on a no-fill order by the state due to structural issues with the dam. The City of Fruita Public Works Department has been lowering the reservoir by a combination of siphon and open outlet as required by the state. The city has also tracked reservoir levels and provided routine observations during the dewatering process. As of July 19th, the reservoir is essentially back to zero storage and the Emergency Action Plan activation has been terminated.
- Utility Locates. Utility staff completed 81 utility locates this week.
- *CIRSA Training.* Public Works and Parks staff completed a two-day CIRSA training that covered Flagger Certification, Safe Driving Strategies, Forklift Operations, and Hazardous Operations.
- Welcome Lynn! Lynn Reynolds joined the Public Works Utilities division on Monday. Welcome to the crew, Lynn!
