Tuesday's City Council Meeting

We will begin our meeting on Tuesday night with three proclamations and a presentation on an award that the City of Fruita received. After that, and our normal agenda items, we will move on to four public hearing items on planning and development items. On the Administrative Agenda, staff will present the first reading of an ordinance amending the land use code, specifically regarding the POST (Parks, Open Space and Trail) Impact Fee and Transportation Impact Fees. No formal action is needed on this, as the first reading just sets a hearing date for the amendments for a future meeting. On the Council Reports and Actions, the Council will rescind the Local Disaster Emergency Declaration (the COVID-19 Emergency Declaration) and will participate in three Executive Sessions. - Question: Does the City of Fruita spray for mosquitoes?
- Answer: No, but the Grand River Mosquito Control District does. To help protect the honeybee population and for increased public acceptance, the district only sprays after dark when honeybees have returned to their hives. This is why you might see or hear their fog truck late at night. General Updates

- *CML Spring Outreach Meeting.* On Wednesday afternoon, we hosted the Colorado Municipal League's Spring ("CML") Outreach Meeting for our district at the Fruita Community Center. CML provided a recap of the legislative session, an overview of upcoming CML events, and then each agency provided an update. It was great to hear from the CML staff and our partner organizations throughout the valley. CML staff also stopped by after the meeting to celebrate their 100-year anniversary of the organization.
- Government Affairs Committee. On Tuesday, Planning and Development Director Dan Caris,
 Parks and Recreation Director Marc Mancuso, and I provided a City update to the Fruita Area
 Chamber of Commerce Government Affairs Committee. We provided an update on the Building
 Inspections Program, changes to the Land Use Code, potential changes to the POST (Parks, Open
 Space, and Trails) Impact Fee, and discussed Enoch Lake and the Mountain Properties. The
 committee members asked some great questions, and it was a good discussion.
- Presentation to One Riverfront Foundation Board. Marc and Dan joined me again to present to
 the Foundation board to update them on the Highway 340 connection design project (Received
 a CDOT grant to match with the Foundation's funds and awaiting our CDOT contract) and begin
 discussing possible ways the Foundation can partner with the Lagoon Redevelopment in the
 future.
- Presentation to the Associated Members for Growth and Development (AMGD). Planning and Development Director Dan Caris and I presented our upcoming code and impact fee changes to the AMGD group in Grand Junction Thursday morning. The code changes were highly welcomed.
- Property Taxes and Rising Values. Mesa County Commissioners released a letter explaining the
 increase in property values over the past few years. On average, property values have risen 39%
 and many residents have concerns about the impact this has on property taxes. To view the

Engineering

• Pine Street Bridge Update. Black Eagle, the contractor responsible for the Xcel high-pressure gas main installation, continued work on the 4" steel pipeline across the bridge. The pipeline has been hung on the bridge with sections welded together to extend to the final connection locations on each end of the bridge. A high-pressure test is currently being completed to verify the adequacy of welds and construction. Black Eagle intends to work this Saturday to keep their work schedule intact and ensure they are prepared for the permanent main tie in on Thursday of next week. The high-pressure gas main installation is scheduled for completion on Friday, June 9, 2023. The Engineering Department would like to remind the public that the bridge remains closed to all modes of transportation including vehicular, bicycles and pedestrians. Public safety is a primary concern and hazardous conditions remain and will continue to change in location and severity in the construction zone.



• **2023 Road Overlays.** Milling will begin Friday June 9, 2023, with paving beginning on June 13. It is anticipated that paving will take 3-4 days. Locations identified can be found here.

Marketing and Promotion

- GoFruita Newsletter. The latest edition of the GoFruita newsletter is now available and can be found here.
- Gravel Adventure Guide. The Fruita + Palisade Gravel Adventure Guide is complete and has been sent to the printer. Creating a Mesa County Gravel Adventure Guide was one of the goals identified in the work plan for the Fruita and Palisade marketing partnership. The Gravel Guide includes information on Mesa County, 11 unique routes for gravel cyclists (both in print and online), spotlights on local businesses, historic information on the two destinations, and more. It is estimated that printing will be done either next week or the week after. The Fruita Tourism Advisory Council will be hosting a pickup party for the guide once complete, and copies will be available for free at our local businesses. We are excited for this project to be complete, and are thankful for the state's partnership in funding the guide (the Office of Outdoor Recreation is funding most of this project).



Parks and Recreation

- Summer youth programs starting next week. Tennis camp, Track and Field Camp, FutureCats Soccer Camp, Peewee Soccer, and June dance sessions are all starting next week. We have a full summer of youth activities for our community.
- Aquatics Staff taught 2 courses certifying new Lifeguards and Swim Instructors. 7 Red Cross Certified Lifeguards and 4 Water Safety Instructors completed their course last week which was taught in-house at the Fruita Community Center.
- Fruita Bark Park Temporarily Closed. Unfortunately, foxtail weeds have been identified throughout the dog park which can be dangerous to animals. Crews are working as quickly as possible to clear the park, but the park will be closed until it is safe for all users. Thank you for your patience as we work to clean up the park.

Public Works

- **Street and Pavement Evaluations.** The city's contractor Roadway Asset Services (RAS) completed the data collection this week for the updated street and pavement evaluations. RAS will take the data files collected from the vehicle and link to the data provided by the city to begin the analysis.
- Mountain Water Properties Update. Public Works staff went to the Mountain Water properties to install a meter and check on conditions of Reservoir #2. Reservoir #2 is under a "No Fill" order by the State Dam Engineers due to dam structure. This reservoir inadvertently filled due to the amount of snowfall. Staff is currently syphoning water out of the reservoir to draw the water level down and empty the reservoir per the state order. Staff has contacted the State to inform them of the conditions and additional notifications have been made for emergency contacts. Due to current conditions, the City of Fruita is warning recreation users to stay off the dam at Reservoir #2.
- *Utilities Updates.* Utilities division completed 32 utility locates this week bringing the total number of locates for the month of May to 238. Crews continue to respond to irrigation issues due to the amount of sediment in the system. Public Works, Engineering, and Parks met earlier this week to discuss possible alternatives for irrigation water and will be looking to put together some information for budget season.
- Water Coordination Meeting. Public Works Director participated in the Western Slope Runoff/High Water Coordination meeting.
