Busy Weekend in Fruita!

It is going to be another busy weekend in Fruita!

- Girls on the Run is tomorrow at Shelledy Elementary school. The race starts at 10:00 a.m., and uses Ottley Avenue, Maple Street, and the Big Salt Wash Trail (just west of Comstock West). View the full race map online.
- Adventure Fest, hosted by Gemini Adventures, is this weekend at 18 Road. Adventure Fest includes a 50K Bike Race, a Fruita Trail Half Marathon, and a 50k Gravel Bike Race. To learn more about the Adventure Fest, you can visit the Adventure Fest website

Special events will continue next weekend with the **Fruita Fat Tire Festival** and the **Co2UT** Race (both at Civic Center Park and 18 Road Trail System).

Spring Clean Up Event Recap

In the city's third year of hosting the Spring Clean Up Day last weekend, Fruita residents filled up two (yes, 2!) 40-yard dumpsters with trash to be disposed of at the landfill within the first hour. In addition, Public Works crews hauled 12.02 Tons or 24,148 lbs. of trash and other material and 3.26 Tons or 6,520 lbs. of yard waste to the landfill separately. Crews estimate approximately 8-10 yards of scrap metal that will be recycled, 2 dumpsters full of cardboard that will be recycled, and several mattresses and box springs that were disposed of. Multiple Trail Closures on Riverfront Trail System

Due to spring runoff, there are multiple trail closures along the Colorado Riverfront Trail in Fruita and Grand Junction. Trail closures are anticipated over the next few weeks as water levels fluctuate. Crews are working on reopening trails as soon as possible, but it is largely dependent on river flows. For the most current information, you can visit <u>our Facebook page.</u> Here is a summary of the trail closures as of today, May 5, 2023:

- **Fruita** The Kokopelli Section of the Colorado Riverfront Trail is closed under the I-70 underpass near the Loma exit.
- **Grand Junction** The Colorado Riverfront Trail is closed at Redlands Parkway underpass. This closure cuts off a large section of the Riverfront Trail from Redlands Parkway and the Walker Wildlife Area. A detour is in place on Riverside Parkway/River Road from 25 Road to Railroad Avenue. A detour map has been provided by the City of Grand Junction.



Irrigation Line Break Repairs Continue into Next Week

On Wednesday afternoon, our crews responded to an irrigation line break on Pine Street south of Aspen Avenue. The break only impacted traffic for a short time but City irrigation users and HOAs on the Encanto irrigation line have been impacted by the break. Crews are working as quickly as possible to get the break repaired. A large amount of work will happen early next week to fix the break. Irrigation users south of Ottley Avenue and West of Pine Street will be without irrigation water over the weekend into early next week. We appreciate the community's patience as our crews work through this large repair.



ArborWorks Schedule for Next Week

Xcel Energy, working with AborWorks, a utility line clearance company, began trimming trees in Fruita in mid-February. They will be trimming all trees, both private and public, if the tree is a hazard for powerlines. The team will continue tree trimming services in Fruita next week. Below you can find area maps of where the team will be working.

Weekly FAQ

In every weekly update, we will be answering one question we get asked often from the community. These questions will cover a variety of topics from all city departments. If you have any questions, you think would be valuable for us to share, let us know by emailing communications@fruita.org.

- Question: What are the different colored paint markings we often see on streets and sidewalks?
- Answer: The markings you see are color codes for locating utility lines underground. Before any type of construction can take place, all utility lines underneath the work area have to be identified. Here is a breakdown of what each color represents:
 - Red Electric Power Lines, Cables, Conduit and Lighting Cables
 - Yellow Natural Gas, Oil Steam, Petroleum, or Gaseous Materials
 - o Orange Communication, Fiber Optic, Alarm or Signal Lines, Cables or Conduit
 - Blue Potable Water

- Purple Reclaimed Water, Irrigation and Slurry Lines
- Green Sewers and Drain Lines
- Pink Temporary Survey Markings
- White Proposed Excavating

General Updates

- **SB 23-213 Update.** Senate Bill 23-213, the statewide land use pre-emption bill, passed the house floor on the second reading yesterday and is scheduled for a third reading this afternoon. We have been in touch with Representative Soper and Senator Rich and provided them with our formal resolution opposing the bill. The legislative session is scheduled to adjourn tomorrow, and we should have additional clarity on SB 23-213 by the end of the day.
- US 6 & 20 Road CDOT Project. CDOT continues to work on the US 6 & 20 Road intersection. 20
 Road should be open by the end of next week and will close again in future phases in the fall.

Engineering

- Mulberry Plaza Update. The Mulberry Street Outdoor Plaza project is nearing final completion, with irrigation, electrical and natural gas facilities almost complete. A few perennials are left to be planted but that should be completed today. Some furniture was delivered to the site yesterday and will be placed throughout the project today for folks to use over the weekend. As a reminder, though pedestrian access is open, some construction activities will continue into next week so please use caution when walking through the area. Also, a quick reminder to the bicycling community please dismount and walk your bike through the space to avoid unwanted interactions between bikes and pedestrians. The City of Fruita thanks the community and local businesses for their patience and positivity throughout this project and we hope that you will come down and spend some time in our new downtown gathering area this weekend!
- **Pine Street Bridge Update**. This was a milestone week for the project. GA Western completed the last concrete placements for the bridge structure by placing the sidewalks across the approach slabs and the bridge curbs on both the east and west sides of the bridge. There remains a considerable amount of work to complete the bridge; including the permanent installation of utilities across the new bridge, installation of safety features, concrete sidewalks leading to the bridge and road paving. We would like to remind the public that the bridge remains closed to all modes of transportation including vehicular, bicycles and pedestrians. Safety features have not been installed and hazards still remain in the construction zone.



Parks and Recreation

• Fishing is Fun had over 80 kids attend on Saturday. Our annual event in partnership with Colorado Parks and Wildlife had over 80 kids come out to Snooks Bottom to kick off the fishing season. CPW handed out free fishing rods and the City provided fishing lures to help local kids get interested in fishing.

Police Department

• Calls for Service Statistics. In April 2023 the Grand Junction Regional Communications Center logged 935 calls for service for the Fruita Police Department. This compares with 764 calls for service in April 2023, showing a 22% increase. Year to date, we are at 3,589 calls for service in 2023 compared with 2,594 this time last year, showing a 38% increase. It should be noted that the majority of that increase results from a change in the way we are tracking officer-initiated activities.

Public Works

Spring Runoff Preparation. Public Works Director participated in the National Weather Service
Western Slope Runoff/High Water Coordination Meeting. Crews are keeping a close eye on
spring runoff conditions and the Streets Division continues to work on filling sandbags in the
event they are needed to protect critical infrastructure. Crews will be checking on Reservoir #2
as it may fill this year which will require the city to respond and siphon water out of the
reservoir.

• Spring Runoff Reporting. The Dolores River and all main channels in Mesa County are currently running much above normal. Colorado Highway 141 between Naturita and Gateway will likely be closed Friday evening due to forecasted high river flows. If the river reaches expected levels, the Colorado Department of Transportation plans to close the highway at 5 p.m. and will remain closed until the flood danger has subsided. CDOT reports that river flows in the area have not been observed at these levels in 18 years.
