- Question: What is Fruita's leash law when it comes to dogs?
- Answer: Dogs must be leashed at all times in public spaces in Fruita. This includes local parks and downtown Fruita. However, there are a few exceptions if the dog is well-behaved, and they can be controlled verbally. Dogs are allowed off leash at Snooks Bottom Open Space, the new Fruita Bark Park, and on the nearby Bureau of Land Management (BLM) trails. When hiking, enjoying Snooks Bottom, or at the dog park, dogs need to be leashed in the parking lot and at the trailhead. We answered questions about economic development, housing, growth, and land use code changes. It was a great discussion, and we were excited to share recent success stories in Fruita. Administration

Annual Financial Audit. The auditors that complete an annual review of the City's financial
statements were on site last week and have wrapped up their fieldwork. Staff will present an
overview of the financial statements to the City Council at a future meeting this summer, and
that will be accompanied by a presentation from the accounting firm on any findings from the
audit.

Engineering

- **Welcome Greyson!** This week, Greyson Wagner started with the Engineering Department as the Engineering Intern. Greyson is going to be a Senior at Colorado Mesa University next year, and we are excited to have him on board for the summer. The Engineering Department has been hosting an intern for the past several years, and it has been very successful. Welcome Greyson!
- Pine Street Bridge Update. Ben Dowd Construction, the pipe subcontractor, extended a stormwater drain on the southeast corner of the bridge to mitigate erosion problems that developed during construction. They are also relocating an irrigation drain line on the northeast corner of the bridge to eliminate installation conflicts with the high-pressure gas main, distribution gas main and guardrail intended for that area of the bridge. Black Eagle, the contractor responsible for the high-pressure gas main installation, mobilized to the site and began excavating trenches for the final pipeline location and began preparing the 4" steel pipe that is being installed across the bridge. The high-pressure gas main installation is scheduled for completion on June 9, 2023. The Engineering Department would like to remind the public that the bridge remains closed to all modes of transportation including vehicular, bicycles and pedestrians. Public safety is a primary concern and hazardous conditions remain and will continue to change in location and severity in the construction zone.



Mulberry Plaza Update. Sparks Fly Studio added the finishing art pieces to the firepit this
morning. The contractor is working on the set-up for turning on the flames during operating
hours.

Police Department

• Junior Citizens Police Academy (JCPA). We are actively taking applications for our JCPA, which will be taking place in July.

Public Works

- Road Assessment Project. The Roadway Assessment project kicked off this week. Folks may see a van with various pieces of equipment driving the streets of Fruita over the next week. This project is a comprehensive objective approach in evaluating our road system. This service provides real time quality control in the field for system monitoring. Their system classifies and quantifies alligator/fatigue cracking using a crack density analysis of neighboring grids, all cracking is assessed, measuring each crack, and analyzing the geometry of the crack to assign proper classifications. The information we receive will give us a network average pavement condition index score, percent of good roads, and identifies the percent of backlog of very poor, serious, and failed roads. In addition, this program will conduct a curb and gutter inventory, sidewalk and sign inventory, and ADA curb ramp inventory. The city received an administrative grant from the Colorado Department of Local Affairs for this project.
- **Fiber Internet Construction Meetings.** Weekly construction meetings with Deeply Digital, Public Works and Engineering continue to discuss areas they will be working on and any construction issues that arise.
- **Wildfire Mitigation.** Public Works staff met with Lower Valley Fire Protection District and Parks to discuss assistance with wildfire mitigation efforts.
- **Chips for Chipsealing.** Streets crew began hauling chips from Whitewater to the Public Works facility in preparation for chipsealing and will continue hauling into next week. The picture below shows a little more than half of the amount of chips that will be needed for the chipsealing project.



- *Irrigation Update.* Utilities crew continues to respond to numerous irrigation calls due to the muddy condition of the water and completed an irrigation repair on N. Peach St. Utilities crew also responded to 41 utility locates this week.
- **Mountain Water Turn On.** Public Works staff are preparing for mountain water turn on. Staff will go to the mountain next week to evaluate the conditions of reservoirs and install a meter.
