Tuesday's City Council Meeting

Tuesday night will begin with recognizing the students and teachers of the month from the Fruita 8/9 School followed by three proclamations. The first proclamation is for Mesa County RSVP's 50th Anniversary, followed by a proclamation for the High School Military Commitment Recognition Day, and ending with a proclamation for Arbor Day. After these recognitions, the Council will receive a presentation from the Historic Preservation Board. The meeting will continue with consideration of multiple items on the consent agenda and five public hearings. There are several items on the Council reports and actions, including a recommendation for the Ute Water Board Appointment, a resolution opposing Senate Bill 23-213 (the statewide land use and zoning bill), and two executive sessions. Desert RATS Trail Running Festival This Weekend

Festival season has arrived with our first event happening this weekend at the Fruita Civic Center! The Desert RATS Trail Running Festival is scheduled for this Saturday and Sunday, April 14 – 16. The event hosts a 100K, 50K, 21K, and a 10K at the Kokopelli Trail system. Civic Center Park is hosting the festival's main gathering area for packet pick up, expos, the after-race party, and more. With this, downtown Fruita and the Kokopelli Trail System is going to be busy this weekend, as there are around 1,000 runners participating in the event. Understanding the Impacts of Spring Runoff

With an increase in temperatures over the past few weeks, we will experience more spring runoff from the winter snowpack. The City of Fruita is preparing and evaluating areas around the City of Fruita that have either been impacted in past high-water years or are considered low lying areas that could experience flooding. If necessary, we may close areas of the trail system and other low-lying areas impacted by high water and debris.

• What the City of Fruita is doing to prepare:

- Receiving updates on current conditions and possible changes to spring runoff.
- \circ $\;$ Identifying areas that could be impacted by high runoff and debris.
- Preparing to close and/or protect certain City of Fruita infrastructure from flooding.
- What you can do to prepare:
 - Making sure you are aware of potential risks associated with flooding is important.
 Whether you are planning to recreate in or near the Colorado River or if you are worried about flooding on your property, take the necessary steps to learn about how you can stay safe during this high runoff year.
 - Learn about floodplain management and flood insurance.
 - Understand the safety risks when recreating on the Colorado River.
 - Stay up to date on City, County, and State information.

- Question: If I see a streetlight out, who can I report this to?
- Answer: If there is a streetlight out in Fruita, you can contact Fruita Public Works at 970-858-9558. Most streetlights around Fruita take coordination between the City and Excel Energy to replace. Once we are aware of the outage, we will coordinate to ensure the light gets fixed. Thank you for helping keep Fruita safe and inviting!

General Updates

• *Financial Reports.* The draft financial reports for February 2023 are now available and can be found in the Council packet for next Tuesday night (at this <u>link</u> when available). Quick overview of the financial reports, when compared to February of the previous year, City sales tax collections increased 7%, and is trending at an increase of 14% year-to-date (an increase of \$66,000 through February). Use taxes on motor vehicles (up 31% in February, trending at an increase of 18% year-to-date), Use taxes on building materials (up 66% in February, 25% year-to-date), County sales taxes (up 1% in February, 2% when compared to 2022) and Lodging tax collections (up 35% when compared to the previous February, 16% year-to-date) were all also up. The County Public Safety sales tax decreased slightly compared to the previous February (less than .5%) but is still trending at an increase.

- US 6 & 20 Rd. CDOT Project. The Colorado Department of Transportation (CDOT) and their contractor began the process of widening and reconstructing Highway 6 and 20 road. The new intersection will realign the northbound approach to 20 road. The project began on March 27 and work is expected to be complete in early August 2023. - **CML Spring Outreach Meeting.** We will be hosting the Colorado Municipal League Spring Outreach Meeting at the Fruita Community Center on May 31, 2023, at 3:00 p.m. These meetings are an opportunity to meet with neighboring communities and get an update at the end of the legislative session and what it means for each community. Please let us know if you would like to be registered for the meeting.
- Japanese Beetle: How to Treat Your Property. Mesa County has released helpful information for residents interested in treating their property to protect against the Japanese Beetle. The Japanese Beetle is an invasive insect that feeds on over 300 species of desirable plants including grapes, peaches, roses, apples, sweet corn, trees, and turf grass. - **Mesa County Draft Mater Plan.** Mesa County has released their draft master plan and is asking for feedback from the community. There will be two open houses on April 27 and May 2. Learn more about the plan and open houses <u>here</u>.

- **Update on EV Charging Stations.** The concrete pads for the two electric vehicle charging stations will be poured next Tuesday, and we anticipate that the stations will be placed at the Civic Center the following week. The North Parking lot at the Fruita Civic Center will be closed on Tuesday to allow the contractors to work on the concrete the pads.

Engineering

• North Mulberry Street Outdoor Plaza Update. This week contractors installed overhead lighting and shade sails and finished the remaining decorative concrete. Decorative brick work was also started and is expected to be completed by early next week. Next week there will be some disruption to traffic and parking on the north end of the project, as contractors will be regrading and repaving Mulberry St. in that area. Vehicular traffic will not be allowed across Mulberry St. at the alley for about two weeks while concrete is installed and allowed to cure. We appreciate your patience while we work to complete the improvements.



• **Pine Street Bridge Update**. GA Western stripped the forms on the north and south abutments and wing walls. Backfilling was started on the north abutment. The forms and rebar for the sidewalks across the bridge were completed and prepared for concrete placement next week. Rebar and forms were prepared and concrete placed for the foundation of the large block retaining wall on the southwest corner of the bridge. The storm drain on the southeast corner of the bridge was installed by Ben Dowd Construction.



Parks and Recreation

- Youth Scholarship Golf Tournament raised \$7,170! Our annual fundraiser for the Parks and Recreation scholarship fund had 22-hole sponsors and 76 golfers this year! This will fund 3 month passes to be distributed to local school students for summer break as well as the scholarship program for youth to participate in parks and recreation programming.
- Arbor Day Posters are on display at the Fruita Community Center! Artwork displayed is part of the Colorado state competition for Arbor Day posters that displayed the theme "Dream as Big as Trees". Our four local winners were sent to the statewide competition in Denver. We will continue to display art from our local elementary schools until May 5.
