Tuesday's City Council Meeting

The meeting will begin with a number of proclamations and presentations, including recognition of student and teachers of the month, teacher appreciation week, police week, receiving a United Way award, Bike To Work Day, and a presentation by the Fruita Tourism Advisory Council. The remainder of the meeting includes a consent agenda, public hearings for liquor licenses and a budget amendment, and following city manager and council updates, there are two executive sessions.

The annual Fruita Spring Clean Up is NEXT Saturday, April 29 from 8:00 am - 2:00 pm at the Fruita City Shops located at 900 Keifer Avenue. Drop off most items for Free! Mattresses and box springs can be dropped off for \$18. Cash or check will be accepted. These are items we CANNOT collect: Aerosol cans, air conditioners, air/gas cylinders, ammunition, antifreeze, asbestos materials, asphalt rubble, batteries, auto batteries, concrete rubble, electronics, engines/motors, fluorescent lights, freezers, freon, fuel tanks, gasoline/grease/oil, hazardous waste, insecticides, items longer than 6', large drums, liquids of any kind, major appliances, medical waste, microwaves, paint/stain, pesticides, refrigerators, road flares, shingles, spa/pool chemicals, tires.


Weekly FAQ

- Question: What are some of the best routes to take to bike around Fruita?
- Answer: With Bike Month starting next week, this is a great time to try out one of Fruita's
 wayfinding routes. There are four routes around Fruita. Each route will take you by major stops
 in the city like the Fruita schools, the Fruita Community Center, downtown, City Market and

General Updates

- **Welcome, Jennifer!** This week, Jennifer Cupp started as the Executive Assistant for the City Manager's Office. Welcome Jennifer!
- ICMA Credentialed Manager. I received notice that the International City Manager Association
 Credentialing Advisory Board approved my annual renewal application which details 30+ hours
 of professional development per year, areas of study and goals for new year. For more

- CCCMA Annual Conference. I enjoyed attending the annual Colorado City/County Manager
 Conference this week with a couple of staff. We were able to connect with many colleagues
 discussing common efforts as well as attend many sessions covering topics, like public safety
 liability, cyber security, US Census data, state economic outlook, dealing with blurring lines of
 truths and facts, communications, leadership, and more.
- **ESPIOC Conference.** Communications and Engagement Specialist Ciara DePinto attended the annual conference for Colorado Public Information Officers. She had the opportunity to connect with other western slope communicators from Grand Junction, Telluride, Montrose, Ouray, Parachute, and more. The conference was full of engaging sessions on emergency communications, telling your organization's story, being prepared for an emergency, language access, media interviews, and more.
- Grand Junction Regional Airport Full-Scale Emergency Exercise. A full-scale emergency exercise will take place on Tuesday, May 2nd, between 9:00 a.m. and 12:00 p.m. on the southern portion of airport property. Travelers on Interstate 70 and Horizon Drive may see a large first responder presence and/or simulated smoke from the exercise. Regularly scheduled flights and traffic corridors are excluded from this exercise and should not experience any impacts from the training. The purpose of the exercise is to give the airport, mutual aid partners and emergency responders the opportunity to train for a real aircraft emergency in a safe and controlled environment. This live exercise will be conducted in compliance with Federal Aviation Administration requirements and in coordination with our local emergency partners including our local fire and police departments.
- *Civic Center Remodel.* The City received its Certificate of Occupancy for the 325. E Aspen Ave. office remodel. The contractor has moved the fenced area within the parking lot.



- Bivalent Booster Available. The Public Health Clinic is now taking appointments for the
 second bivalent COVID-19 booster. People who are 65 or older and have received a booster at
 least four months prior are eligible. Those with weakened immune systems can get a second
 bivalent booster as long as their last shot was at least two months ago. Learn more on Mesa

- **US 6 & 20 Road CDOT Project Update.** CDOT continues work to US 6 & 20 Road. In the most recent update, the paving of the northside of US Highway 6 and approaches is complete and crews are continuing work on the shoulders of US 6. Read the full update in their newsletter.
- **Electric Vehicles Charging Stations Update.** The two Electric Vehicle Charging Stations at the Civic Center were installed this week. There is still a little bit of work to do before the charging stations are open, which includes finishing up the electrical, activating the stations, and painting the parking spots.



Engineering

• **Pine Street Bridge Update.** GA Western completed the formwork, reinforcing steel and concrete placement for the south sleeper slab (independent support slab for the approach slab) and north approach slab. The south approach slab is formed with reinforcing steel in place, the concrete placement is scheduled for Friday afternoon.



- **Engineering Intern.** Staff conducted interviews for the summer intern position this week. Engineering has provided an intern position for about 6 years now with great success.
- N. Mulberry Plaza. The end of construction is in sight! This week our contractor finished the concrete work on the project, which is a big milestone. The remaining work, which is slated to be completed by the end of next week, consists of irrigation system and plant/tree installation. Some lighting fixtures are also slated to be installed, which will complete the lighting portion of the project. The City wants to express its gratitude and appreciation to the public for the positive response we have had to the project. In addition, we'd like to thank local businesses for their patience and good will during the construction. Though a good portion of the plaza is open to the public at this point, construction continues and there are still hazards on the job site. Please use caution when travelling through the construction area.

Parks and Recreation

- *Fruita Bark Park update.* We are working on adding additional signage to designate the different dog park sections as well as adding ADA parking near the park. We hope to complete the installation of the signage and parking lot updates next week. Parks crews are working hard to install some benches as soon as possible.
- Outdoor pool is being prepped for summer use. The pool needs pressure washing, backwashing to prepare the filter, preparation of fittings in the pump room, and rails and skimmer baskets installed. The outdoor pool will need 133,000 gallons of water to fill and then chemicals will need to balanced. After all that work, the pool will be ready for public use!

Arbor Day tree planting at Monument Ridge Elementary Friday morning. After our area wide
poster contest, Ady Ono was chosen as the overall winner to receive a tree at their school. The
tree will be planted at their campus along with a ceremony of recognition by our city

Public Works

- **Spring Runoff.** The Upper Colorado River Basin shows 123% snowpack and is still accumulating snow with weather moving through the area. Public Works crews continue to fill sandbags to have on hand in the event public infrastructure is impacted by high water. As the temperatures increase and if it warms quickly there will be potential for flooding. Information on protective measures you can take before, during and after a flood may be found at www.mesacounty.us/news/public-works/know-your-flood-risk.
- **Flood Insurance.** People can ask for flood insurance through their insurance company or obtain it through the National Flood Insurance Program administered by the Federal Emergency Management Agency. It takes 30 days for flood insurance to go into effect.
- *Irrigation Update*. Public Works staff responded to approximately 25 calls regarding irrigation since turning on the system early last week. The city encourages residents to call Public Works and report issues with the irrigation system. Our crews can assess whether it is a city issue or an HOA issue to help resolve the matter.
- Internet Fiber in Fruita. The City has been working with several companies interested in installing fiber in the City of Fruita. Residents may begin to see work being done throughout the city in the next week or two. Information will be posted weekly on areas where fiber crews will be working.




