North Parking Lot at the Civic Center Closed Next Week

Work on the electrical upgrades for the two Electric Vehicle Charging Stations at the Fruita Civic Center is scheduled to continue next week, and because of this, the north parking lot will be closed next week and potentially longer. Last month, Xcel's contractor installed a new pole for the upgrades, and the additional work that needs to be completed includes installing transformers on that pole and laying the conduit/electrical to the parking spots that will be used. Once the electrical upgrades are complete, staff can schedule the installation of the two stations and painting for the parking spaces. Work is scheduled to begin on Monday with mobilization.

ArborWorks Schedule for Next Week

Xcel Energy, working with AborWorks, a utility line clearance company, began trimming trees in Fruita in mid-February. They will be trimming all trees, both private and public, if the tree is a hazard for powerlines. The team will continue tree trimming services in Fruita next week. General Updates

- **Congressional Directed Spending Requests.** This week, staff submitted four projects to be considered for Congressional Directed Spending to Senators Bennet and Hickenlooper. The projects submitted included the replacement of the Maple Street Bridge, 19 Road Improvements, Fremont Street Improvements, and a request to replace aging sewer lines in Fruita. After the deadline today, all projects from across the state will be reviewed and each Senator recommends specific projects to be included in the federal appropriations process. We will continue to provide updates as more information becomes available.
- **Broadband Meeting with CDOT.** On Thursday, Fruita staff (City Engineer Sam Atkins, Assistant City Manager Shannon Vassen, and I) participated in a meeting with the Executive Director of the Colorado Department of Transportation ("CDOT") Shoshana Lew and many other agencies in Mesa County and Garfield County to discuss current broadband projects in our region. The meeting discussion focused on helping other organizations utilize CDOT assets for fiber projects across Western Colorado. The discussion was positive, as CDOT has identified alternative splice points for the other agencies to use for their projects. Based on this, we are going to continue with our Broadband Project and anticipate our construction schedule will not change. Our Requests for Proposals for our Middle-Mile/Lateral Build is scheduled to close next Friday.
- Japanese Beetles in Mesa County. On Tuesday morning, the Mesa County Board of County Commissioners declared the Japanese Beetle to be a public nuisance and directed staff to coordinate with residents to take emergency action to quarantine, control, and/or eradicate the beetle in Mesa County. Currently, the "hot zone" for the Japanese Beetle in Mesa County is north of G Road to I-70 (west and slightly east of 26 Road) in northern Grand Junction. To prevent spread, Mesa County employees will be working with homeowners on treatment options. The Japanese Beetle, Mesa County shared, feeds on over 300 species of plants, including farm plants, and can cause severe damage to local farms and landscaped properties. In addition to that, the Colorado State University Extension Campus has released a lot of information on the Beetle that can be found <u>here</u>, and will be hosting an informational meeting at the Central Library Community Room on Tuesday, April 11, 2023, from 6:00 p.m. - 7:00 p.m. Details on that event are available at this link on the library's website.
- *Monthly Report from Waste Management.* In February, Fruita residents recycled 47 tons of bottles, cans, paper, and cardboard. Great job Fruita! The full report from Waste Management can be found below.

Engineering

- **Pine Street Bridge Update.** Work on the bridge deck is on hold until parts are delivered to help with forming the cantilevered portion on the outside limits of the bridge. The placement of the bridge deck is dependent on the delivery of these parts. GA Western delivered and installed a pedestrian bridge for the temporary irrigation main on the west side of the Pine Street Bridge. Ben Dowd Construction, the pipeline subcontractor, installed the storm drain on the northwest corner of the bridge. The temporary irrigation main was started by installing a 10" gate valve and 4" drain line on the north end of the bridge. Work on the southwest storm drain is progressing.
- *Mulberry Street Plaza Progress.* Good progress was made on the Mulberry St. Plaza this week. The crosswalks on Aspen Street and Mulberry reopened, a few of the light posts were installed, and quite a bit of decorative concrete was placed against the buildings on both sides of the project. All of the footers for shade sail posts and light posts on the west side of the plaza have been installed and only four footers remain to be installed. More concrete was supposed to be placed today but is on hold due to the rain. We expect the east edge of the project to be open to pedestrians by the end of next week, which will allow pedestrians to access the Vintage Commons, the Hot Tomato, and the rest of the businesses along Mulberry from both the north and south ends of the project. As always, please remember to stay away from the active construction zone and to use caution when walking next to heavy equipment. We thank you for your patience while we work to improve our downtown.

Parks and Recreation

- Update on the Gym Floor Installation at the Fruita Community Center. The painting of the court lines and logo are complete and four additional layers of topcoat will be applied. During the application of the topcoat layers, the running track will be closed to use on March 13 and 14. We are excited for the courts to open to the public next week! A specific date will be announced early next week. Please remember that all court and track availability is subject to change at any time for construction or safety of our patrons.
- **189 youth registered for Spring Soccer and spots are still available!** Registration will close this Sunday, March 12. There are still spots available for youth kindergarten-8th grade. Register online at <u>fruita.activityreg.com.</u>
- **Senior Potluck.** We had a full house at the Senior Potluck this week, and reached our capacity of 70 participants that enjoyed a pork lunch and good company.
- **Our 136 youth volleyball players will be wrapping up their season this weekend.** Youth volleyball for grades 3rd-6th will have their final games Saturday.

Public Works

- **Congratulations Raymond!** Congratulations to Raymond Mikhail for passing his Wastewater Collections I exam!
- **Controlled Burn**. Crews were busy this week cleaning and burning ditches around the city in preparation for irrigation season. This includes the ditch off SE side of Greenway Drive, behind Walgreens, behind Mission Coffee, behind Cedar Glen Apartments, and Highway 6 & 50 from Greenway Drive to Pine Street.
- FOGs Update. Utility staff continues to add grease additive to the I-70 lift station in an effort to break up the grease that comes into the lift station from the collection system. Staff has added approximately 235 gallons over the last two months. Staff started with heavy dozing of 5 gallons per wet well and noticed the grease became much thinner and more liquid like. Staff reduced the dosing to ½ gallon per wet well twice a week and while the grease is not as large in diameter it has become noticeable thicker. Dosing was reduced to determine the effectiveness of the additive at a lower dozing rate and cost. The city continues to encourage residents and businesses to avoid pouring grease down drains. This grease enters the city's collection system and causes damage to the infrastructure and can result in sanitary sewer overflows. Crews continue to haul approximately 1200 gallons of grease a week to the WWRF.
- *Mesa Conservation District Water Resilient Agriculture Workshop.* Public Works Director participated in the Resilient Agriculture Workshop, a two-day Exploratory Scenario Planning workshop to discuss the various futures the region's agriculture industry and community face. The workshop was facilitated by The Babbitt Center and Arizona State University and sponsored by the Mesa Conservation District, Western Colorado Community College, and Mesa County.
- **PFAS Grant.** The City of Fruita Wastewater Reclamation Facility staff recently submitted an application to the Colorado Division of Public Health & Environment (CDPHE) for the PFAS Grant Program funded by the EPA. As of January 1, 2023, preparers of biosolids are required to sample and analyze biosolids for per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances (known as PFAS) and report to the division. PFAS are an emerging contaminant of concern, and the EPA is currently conducting a risk assessment which could lead to developing criteria for PFAS in biosolids.

CDPHE is implementing additional requirements through Regulation 64 for the beneficial use of biosolids as an interim strategy and is supporting preparers of biosolids by paying the costs to have one biosolid sample tested for PFAS and assist with the evaluation of results and reporting requirements. Grant funding covers the costs associated with the laboratory sample kits, laboratory shipping costs, and analytical laboratory reporting.




