
Re: WEEKLY INFORMATION UPDATE

School District 51 Fruita Reconfiguration Survey

As Mesa County Valley School District 51 continues to see a decline in enrollment, they are seeking student, family, and community input on exploring the possibility of reconfiguring Fruita schools to be consistent with the rest of D51. Reed Park Skate/Wheel Park Conceptual Design Meeting Recap

On Tuesday night, community members gathered at the Fruita Civic Center and online to review the conceptual design of the proposed skate/wheel park at Reed Park. It was a great meeting where we were able to show the community the renovation plans for all of Reed Park (playground, shelters, horseshoe pits, electricity, restrooms, Mini Pitch) as well as the designs for the skate park which is an addition to Reed Park on the south/west corner near the playground. The community was excited to see the skate/wheel park design and had some great comments that the designer is working to incorporate into the concept design.

New Playground at Prospector Park

The new playground at Prospector Park opened to the public earlier this week. The playground is a Play On Playground that has been designated as a project of excellence for meeting best practices in youth fitness through sliding, swinging, spinning, climbing, brachiating, and balancing. The playground features two new swings, two slides, an overhead climber, a climbing wall, musical instruments, a spinner, balance pods, and other climbing structures. Last week, parks staff helped install the playground and moved 107 cubic yards of safety surfacing material. We are excited to have this new playground available for the community to enjoy!

General Updates

- Meeting with the Colorado Department of Transportation. On Wednesday morning, Sam Atkins
 (City Engineer), Kimberly Bullen (Public Works Director) and I had the opportunity to meet with
 Shoshana Lew, the Executive Director for the Colorado Department of Transporation ("CDOT"),
 and other CDOT staff. We shared our key transportation projects in the Fruita Strategic Plan and
 learned how to prepare these projects to be eligible for state funding in the future. We also
 discussed regional updates, partnerships, and other CDOT projects.
- Partner Learning Shares. This week I was able to spend time in three separate (additional to the
 CDOT meeting) settings with other organizations to learn and share: with the Town of Gilbert,
 AZ focused on innovative budget processes and even shadowing part of their process, with
 Montrose, CO regarding successful economic development practices, and with the Fruita Area
 Chamber of Commerce to coordinate upcoming work in the community.
- FARM Grand Opening. Don't miss this community event! Celebrate the grand opening of FARM on February 10-11. There will be a variety of events all weekend long showcasing the different artists and services at the FARM. - **Correction on MMOF Grant.** In last week's update, we reported that the City of Fruita received a \$150,000 grant from the Multi-Modal and Mitigation Options Fund (MMOF) program for the design of the Hwy 340 Riverfront Trail Connection. The City was actually awarded a grant of \$160,000 to help with the project.
- **State of the State Highlights.** This afternoon, staff will be attending a State of the State Highlights presentation from Governor Polis. We will provide a recap of the highlights of the event in the update next week.

Administration

Current Job Openings. We are currently accepting applications for several positions at the City
of Fruita. There are many openings at the Fruita Community Center for part-time staff, and we
are also recruiting for a Automotive and Equipment Technician for Fleet Maintenance, a
Wastewater Operator at the Wastewater Reclamation Facility, and an Executive Assistant for

Engineering

- North Mulberry Street Outdoor Plaza. The storm drain is complete, and more sidewalk
 demolition has been going on this week in preparation for the installation of shade sail
 structures and planter curbing. Construction crews will be continuing sidewalk and asphalt
 removal next week and expect to begin construction on foundations for shade sails, a small
 irrigation system and electrical upgrades towards the end of the week. The City asks that
 pedestrians please use the sidewalk along the east edge of Mulberry Street during this phase of
 construction and to refrain from entering the fenced area around the project. We thank you for
 your patience during construction.
- *Pine Street Bridge Update.* Forms and reinforcing steel were completed for both the north and south abutments and wing walls. Concrete is being placed for these abutments on Friday, February 3, 2023. The next big step is the placement of seven (7) girders to support the bridge deck. The girders are concrete boxes 68-feet long, 4-feet wide, and 3-feet deep and will require pilot vehicles for delivery. The current schedule for girder delivery and setting is Friday, February 17, 2023. The route for these oversized trucks has not been established at this time but will be included in next week's update.

Parks and Recreation

- January FCC Attendance. The FCC had a busy January with 16,725 visits. This leaves just 19,850 visits to reach our 2,000,000th visit count!
- **FCC All Staff Meeting.** We had our annual all-staff meeting last weekend! This focus of the meeting was COMMUNICATION with staff learning new tools to improve communication and playing games to highlight its importance. Fruita Community Center staff are the reason that our facility runs so smoothly, and our community has a welcoming place to enjoy. We are thankful for all the hard work and care they have for their jobs!

• Fruita Community Center Court Update. The flooring for the gym at the Fruita Community Center arrived last week! The contractors have installed the sub-floor system and are now spreading out the flooring for acclimation. Next steps for the floor installation are to install/nail down floor before standing and applying sealer coats. The Fruita Parks and Recreation Department will continue to update guests about the status of the gym floors through this weekly update, social media, the biweekly Parks and Rec newsletter, and by emailing members. Public Works

- *Grease Treatment.* Wastewater staff continue to use grease additive for the I-70 lift station. Estimated 130 gallons of biological treatment has been added.
- Wastewater Update. As part of the compliance schedule for the city's discharge permit, the city is required over a four-year period to provide information to the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment on progress the city is making to reduce inflow and infiltration (I/I) into the sewer system. The City has established a collection system database regarding materials and age, performs routine physical condition assessments, has identified loc locations that seem to be more vulnerable to I/I, and developed a risk assessment with detailed scoring that provides guidelines for rehabilitation and replacement. The city has completed the yearly inflow and infiltration information and will be reporting to the State of Colorado.
