Xcel Tree Trimming will Start on Monday

Xcel Energy working with ArborWorks, a utility line clearance company, will begin trimming trees around Fruita to clear powerlines to prevent power outages and wildfires. They will be trimming all trees, both private and public, if the tree is a hazard for powerlines. As ArborWorks begins the tree trimming process, they will speak with Fruita residents to explain the exact specifications and details of the tree trimming. If the resident is not home, ArborWorks will leave a door hanger for the resident with the information. They will also provide the City of Fruita a map each week of the area they plan to work on. Next week, ArborWorks will be working along 21 Road and near Family Dollar and O'Reilly Auto Parts off of Highway 6&50. General Updates

- **FARM Grand Opening Starts Tonight!** The Fruita Arts and Recreation Marketplace grand opening is tonight (4:00 p.m. 8:00 p.m.) and tomorrow! The Grand Opening includes Art workshops, retail specials, kids activities, a ribbon cutting with the Fruita Chamber, live music, food trucks, and more. - **GoFruita Newsletter.** The latest edition of the GoFruita Newsletter can be found here! It covers the updated GoFruita website, Family Fun in February, a highlight on Powderhorn, and more.
- Polis State of the State Address. Last Friday afternoon, staff attended an abbreviated State of the State Address with Governor Polis at West Star Aviation, hosted by the Grand Junction Chamber of Commerce. The Governor discussed the state's priorities in the upcoming year, which include expanding education through universal Pre-K school in Colorado, making Colorado one of the top ten safest states in the Country, and attempting to address housing affordability. In addition, the Governor announced that the Grand Junction Airport received a \$4 million grant to expand runway operations.
- Charging Stations Update. Also, last Friday afternoon, the two fast Electric Vehicle Charging Stations that will be installed at the Fruita Civic Center were delivered. Xcel's contractor visited the site earlier this week and installed the new pole to accommodate the stations. Xcel can now place the transformers on the pole and will run that power to the designated parking spots for the stations. Once Xcel's work is complete, we can schedule installation and also work with Public Works on preparing the parking lot for the stations. Below is a picture of the stations as shipped.



Engineering

- 19 Road Right of Way. Proposals are due on Monday for right of way agents to submit for providing right of way acquisition services.
- N. Mulberry Street Improvements. More sidewalk and asphalt demolition occurred this week, along with the installation of portions of the new irrigation and electrical systems. Next week crews are expected to begin construction on curb and gutter along Aspen Ave. and shade sail/light post foundations, along with more concrete and asphalt demolition. Please use caution when traveling along the edges of the project. Also, this week it appears that some of the traffic control signs for the project were removed by unknown persons. The City asks that residents refrain from moving or removing traffic control devices, as they are there for the safety of pedestrians and removal of those signs can result in accidents that could otherwise be prevented and exposes the City and the contractor to liability for those accidents.
- **Pine Street Bridge Update.** Drain lines and backfilling around the wingwalls and abutments took place this week. The girders are scheduled to be placed at the end of next week so there will be some more congestion on the north side of the bridge with the girder delivery.

Parks and Recreation

- Girls and Boys Youth Basketball and 7/8 Basketball league had 176 participants. Our youth basketball leagues have been very successful this year! Our youth boys league and boys 7/8 league are currently in season with interleague games with GJ Parks and Recreation.
- Fruita Community Center Concessions Off to a Strong Start. Our new concession stand at the front desk at the Fruita Community Center has sold \$909 worth of concessions in its first month. The most popular sellers are candy bars, drinks, and chips.
- Starting on February 15th, all monthly billing for Fruita Community Center memberships will be automated. Members will receive notifications from Sportsmans/Peak Software that their account has been charged for the monthly membership. - **Fruita Community Center Court Update.** The contractors have installed the sub-floor system and the flooring has been spread out for acclimation. The flooring will remain in this position until it has the appropriate moisture content. The next steps for the floor installation are to install/nail down the floor before standing and applying sealer coats. Thank you for your patience with this project!
- Congratulations Tom! Tom Casal, Recreation Superintendent, has accepted a Parks and Recreation Director position with the Town of Timnath. Tom has been with the City of Fruita over 8 years and has helped grow the recreation department to what it is today over his tenure. When asked what he was most proud of while being in Fruita, Tom said, The Roundabouts, Fruita Youth Initiative, the mural at Dinosaur Journey, the growth of Mike the Headless Chicken Festival, and the completion of the Parks, Health, Recreation, Open Space and Trails Master plan. Police Department

Calls for Service Statistics. In January 2023 the Grand Junction Regional Communications Center logged 1,014 calls for service for the Fruita Police Department. This compares with 587 calls for service in January 2022, showing a 73% increase. It should be noted that the majority of that increase results from a change in the way we are tracking officer-initiated activities.

Public Works

- H2S Project Update. Purchase agreements with the biofilter manufacturer and fiberglass manhole manufacturer have been executed. Material delivery is at 20 weeks after the completion of shop drawings.
- **NRCS Preliminary Investigative Feasibility Study.** A stakeholder meeting was held this week to gather additional information about the East Creek Watershed.
- **New Signage on K.4 Road.** "No Parking" signs were installed near Monument Ridge on Fremont Street north of k 4/10 Road on the east side of the road.
- **Potential Funding Opportunities.** Public Works Director Kimberly Bullen participated in a U.S. Department of Transportation Discretionary Grant Opportunity webinar.
- Annual Rocky Mountain Asphalt Conference. Public Works sent two Street Division employees
 to the Annual Rocky Mountain Asphalt Conference & Equipment Show. Mike Bramlett and Jesse
 McClaskey attended the conference to learn about new developments and quality
 advancements in asphalt pavement.
- New Traffic Safety Trailer. Ken Binam, Streets Division recently completed the design & fabrication of the new Traffic Safety trailer, approved in the 2023 budget. This trailer will allow

a quick response during emergencies and special events. The trailer is loaded with traffic safety equipment that otherwise would have to be loaded at the time of call out.


To determine vegetation that needs to be trimmed, our Pre-Inspectors survey power lines and inspect the foliage around them. The Pre-Inspectors will then communicate with property owners and tree crews to schedule the vegetation for trimming and/or removal.

Once the trees are assessed, our crews' work is completed in strict accordance with ANSI A300 and ISA (International Society of Arboriculture) BMP Utility Pruning of Trees standards. The objective of these standards is to manage risk, protect wildlife and wildlife habitats, provide adequate line clearance, improve the aesthetics of the vegetation, and lastly, preserve the health of the vegetation to the maximum extent feasible.
