City of Fruita Receives Grant for Highway 340 Riverfront Trail Design

On Wednesday, it was announced that the City of Fruita will receive \$150,000 from the Multi-Modal and Mitigation Option Funds (MMOF) for the design of the Hwy 340 Riverfront Trail Connection Design. This project involves the design of the Hwy 340 Trail south to the Colorado River and under the bridge at the river to connect with the James M. Robb State Park. This project was originally included in the 2022 Budget, but after going out to bid, was reappropriated to 2023 due to receiving bids that were well above the funds budgeted. This funding will help the city complete the design either this year or next and get professional estimates on the costs for construction of the connection.

Fruita Community Center Court Update

The flooring for the gym at the Fruita Community Center arrived this week! Now that has arrived, the next steps for installation include:

- Install Sub-Floor System
- Rack (spread out for floor pieces for acclimation)
- Install floor/nail down
- Sanding
- Applying two sealer costs
- Painting the court lines and logos
- Applying two layers of top coats
- Final two layers of top coats
- Installing the base pieces and thresholds.

The Fruita Parks and Recreation Department will continue to update guests about the status of the gym floors through this weekly, <u>social media</u>, the biweekly Parks and Rec newsletter, and by emailing members. 
General Updates

- Reported Gas Leak. This morning, Mulberry Street was closed from Pabor Avenue to McCune Avenue and Aspen Avenue was closed from Peach Street to the Circle for a reported gas leak. The Lower Valley Fire Department and the Fruita Police Department responded quickly and conducted evacuations of the area businesses as a precaution while Xcel Energy responded to the gas line. Businesses are starting to reopen. The intersection at Aspen Ave. And Mulberry will remain closed while Xcel repairs the line. Thank you to Lower Valley and Xcel for the quick response! Engineering

Update on N. Mulberry Street Plaza Project. The contractor continued work on the
underground storm drainpipe this week. A few sidewalks and crosswalks were closed this week
for safety. These sidewalks and crosswalks will be closed for the remainder of the project. The
sidewalk on the west side of North Mulberry Street is closed but the sidewalk on the east side is
open. Pedestrians, please remember to be careful and make sure to stay outside of the
construction zone during the project, as there will be excavations that may be hard to see and
heavy equipment working.



• **Update on the Pine Street Bridge Project.** Work continued for the south abutment and wing walls with the reinforcing steel being completed. The foundation for the north abutment and adjoining wing walls was excavated to grade and compacted, the back face forms were set and reinforcing steel is being tied in preparation of concrete placement.

 filter for the hot tub was in need of new laterals. To replace this part, staff moved 2300 lbs of
 sand out of the filter, added new laterals, and will be adding a new batch of 2300 lbs of fresh
 sand. We will continue to work as quickly as possible to have the hot tub available to patrons.

- **Screening Conference.** Admin attended the MCC Drug & Alcohol Screening conference to learn about drug and alcohol suspicion in the workplace and about the CDOT Clearinghouse program for all staff who obtain their CDL license.
- **WWRF Update.** The Wastewater Reclamation Facility ("WWRF") team discussed the state of Colorado's new 2023 Per- and Polyfluorinated substances (PFAS) regulations and begin the application process for the state's PFAS grant. If awarded the grant the WWRF team will be able to test its influent, effluent, and biosolids for PFAS.
