# **Coronavirus Update**

Below are a few updates, but I would strongly encourage all to continue to follow <a href="https://www.fruita.org/covid19">www.fruita.org/covid19</a> for all updates we are posting. This also links to important Mesa County Public Health sources, as well as many others.

- Vaccine Update from MCPH. On Thursday, Mesa County Public Health ("MCPH") released an update on the COVID-19 vaccine distribution in the county. As of last week, 46,255 doses have been administered in Mesa County, and the Grand Junction Convention Center has become one of six state-run mass vaccination sites. This is new partnership allows any person in Colorado to get vaccinated at the Convention Center, and MCPH is increasing available appointment slots there. - Mesa County Moves to Level Blue on COVID-19 Dial. Mesa County continues to experience a decline in cases of COVID-19 and last Sunday, transitioned to Level Blue of the state's COVID-19 dial. Most industries are allowed 50% capacity, and more detailed information can be found at Mesa County Public Health's website <a href="here">here</a> is a brief overview of the Level Blue changes:
- Restaurants 50% capacity or 175 people indoors (or up to 225 depending on space); outdoors six feet between parties.
- Offices 50% capacity
- o Retail 50% capacity
- Personal Services 50% capacity of 50 people
- O Gyms/Fitness 50% capacity or 175 people.
- Group Sports & Camps 50-person capacity per activity
- $\circ$  **Events** Indoor events limited to 50% capacity or 175 people (whether seated or unseated); outdoor events limited to 50% capacity or 250 people.
- Some business may continue to qualify for an exemption of these requirements through the variance protection program. The full chart of Level Blue guidelines and restrictions can be found here or below.
- Facility Updates. Now that Mesa County has moved to Level Blue of the state's COVID-19 dial, the Fruita City Shops building (open 7:00 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.) reopened

- to the public this week and the Fruita Police Department will be open starting next week from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., Monday through Friday. With this, all four facilities are (or will be) open to the public. We will encourage residents to conduct City business online, and limits trips to facilities to essential only.
- **State Dial 3.0.** Staff attended a meeting with the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment today on the COVID-19 dial. The state is anticipating releasing an updated version of the dial next Tuesday, and implementing changes to the different phases of reopening in April. We will provide more information as it becomes available.

# Last Chance to Participate in Fruita Circulation Plan Survey!

If you have not already, there is still time to participate in the public survey for the Fruita Circulation Plan. The survey will close on Wednesday, March 24, 2021. The feedback from this survey will be used to recommend projects, programs, and policies that improve comfort and connectivity for all modes of travel in Fruita. The survey asks for specific corridors and locations where improvements are needed for people walking along or crossing the street, a roadway improvement for drivers, suggested areas to consider a bike lane or trails, and more. #### **General Updates**

- Infrastructure Funding. In coordination with the Mesa County Economic Development First Responders, we continue to advocate to our federal representatives for infrastructure funding in future bills. The City of Fruita, along with the other organizations from the first responders, have identified several shovel ready projects that could be completed if Congress decides to move forward with an infrastructure bill.   and Hot Tomato for now.

- Maple Street Update. Maple Street Sewer project continues south of Aspen Avenue.
