Tuesday's City Council Meeting

Our meeting on Tuesday will begin with old business, and we still start with four proclamations that recognizing Military Bound Graduate Recognition Day, National Donate Life Month, an Arbor Day Proclamation, and May as Grand Valley Bike Month in Fruita. After those proclamations, we have one item on the consent agenda and no public hearings. We will conclude old business with presentations to Mayor Kincaid and Councilor Kreie for their many years of service to the community and the Fruita City Council. We will then take a 15-minutes recess. After that recess, we will begin new business by swearing in the new members of the City Council and Mayor. After a few items on the new business consent agenda, the Council will then review two special event liquor permits for upcoming events. For Council reports and Actions, the City Council will elect a Mayor Pro Tem, and then discuss interest for City Council liaison assignments for the City's Boards and Commissions. 

The change of City Council is scheduled to take place on April 16, 2024, during the regular City Council meeting. The meeting will begin with old business the current City Council considers, followed by the farewell of

Mayor Kincaid, and City Council member Ken Kreie, whose term was completed. Following old business, Mayor Breman and the newly elected Council members Richard Parrish, Aaron Hancey, and Andrea Stolarczyk will take the oath of office to begin their new terms and consider new business on the City Council agenda that night.

Over the past year, your neighborhood may have experienced fiber internet construction, so the likelihood of an irrigation line break from this construction is high. - Question: What is the recommended lawn watering schedule for Fruita residents?
- **Answer:** The City of Fruita recommends the following watering schedule for homeowners with City Irrigation Water:
 - o Even numbered addresses: Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday
 - Odd numbered addresses: Wednesday, Friday and Sunday
 - The Public Works Department utilizes every Monday as a regularly scheduled maintenance day to flush lines and make repairs to the irrigation system.

General Updates

• **Fruita Academy Week #1.** We kicked off the first of the Fruita Academy last night at the Fruita Community Center! We have a fantastic group this year, and we are excited to spend the next four weeks together. We have 22 students and the first class started with a tour of the Fruita Community Center and an overview of the Parks and Recreation Department.





- MOWC Update. On Monday, Shannon and I had the chance to meet with the new Executive Director of the Museums of Western Colorado (MOWC), Shenna Hayden. Shenna comes to Mesa County with great museum experience and has been working in the field since 2008. We discussed our partnership between the City of Fruita and MOWC for Dinosaur Journey, how we can best communicate between the two agencies, and potential joint marketing opportunities in the future. Shenna will present to the City Council this summer to introduce herself and answer any questions from the Council. Welcome Shenna!
- Annual Chamber Banquet. As a reminder, the Annual Fruita Chamber Banquet is tomorrow
 night at Absolute Prestige Ranch from 5:00 p.m. 10:00 p.m. The full schedule, and additional

Administration

- Audit Work. The City's new auditing firm was on site this week to wrap up fieldwork for the annual audit. The audit is on track to be completed early summer and the 2023 Financial Statements will be presented to the City Council soon after. The annual Financial Statements are produced to provide the Mayor, City Council, and residents with useful information about the City's operations and financial position. The reports are prepared in accordance with standards prescribed by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) and the Government Financial Officers Association (GFOA). - RFP for Financial Management Services. This week, we issued a formal Request for Proposals
 ("RFP") for Contracted Municipal Financial Management Services. The City is looking for a
 contractor that can serve as a resource to staff in day-to-day operations of the city, but also if
 needed, can provide interim Management services if needed. View this RFP or others issued by

- **Job Openings.** The City of Fruita continues to recruit for a number of a Full-Time and Part Time positions. For example, we are currently accepting applications for a Finance Director, Police

Parks and Recreation

• Reed Park Update. The playground installation is completed, and the safety surfacing is next to be installed. The engineered wood fiber has been installed and the poured in place material will be installed next week. This is an active construction site, and we ask you to please wait for the park to open before using the playground. MUSCO has completed the installation of the Minipitch and will be installing new basketball hoops before the opening of the park. Sheathing of the shelter has begun, roofers will be installing roofing, and doors will be installed next week. Wheelpark rough grade is scheduled to begin on Monday, April 15th.



- **Sharps containers installed at Heritage Park.** Parks crews installed sharps containers to help eliminate sharps from being flushed down the toilet or placed in the trash can, which has been an issue lately.
- Downtown Restroom Construction started this week. The contractor has started prepping the
 site for the new downtown restroom that will be installed on the corner of Aspen Avenue and
 Peach Street. The contractor will be closing Peach Street on Monday to tie in the sewer and
 water for the restroom. They are anticipating the closure to be Monday and if needed Tuesday

morning. The new restroom will have two unisex units and will be ADA-accessible. It is a self-cleaning facility and will be open to the public from 6 a.m. to 10 p.m. Hours may change based on needs and community events. There will be partial closures of the road for one day to install the bathroom. We anticipate the restroom construction to be completed by the end of April or Early May. There will be minimal impacts to traffic as they install the water and sewer lines.

- **Community Center Waterslide Update.** The contractor has completed demo of the concrete of the pool deck and in the mechanical room. They have located the piles for the foundation, piping for the plumbing and are currently working on plumbing and electrical for the pump.
- Guest Services New Employees. We would like to welcome Audrey Smith and Diane Loken to
 the Guest Services team. They have been a great addition to the team and are picking up their
 new responsibilities quickly.
- **Guest Services Front Desk Access Point.** To better accommodate the incoming and outgoing traffic at the front desk, staff are implementing various directional configurations with stanchions and signage. We are encouraging all members and new patrons to stop at the front desk and either scan their membership fob or check in to ensure that we are collecting accurate participation data, collecting daily pass fees, allowing staff to build relationships with human interaction, and decelerating guests from simply walking though.
- Rec Rats Drop-in Childcare. Drop-in childcare for FCC members continues to be a popular amenity. This past quarter 1036 children participated in a 30-minute -2 hours playtime at Rec Rats. The most popular times, which are 8:00 am-12:00 pm Monday through Saturday dominates with 78% of the total attendance. To encourage the repetitive and frequent facility use for those with children ages 6 months 8 years of age, the hourly rate fee remains sustainable. Future plans could include building upon this activity model and expanding the boundaries of Rec Rats with new programming opportunities.

Police Department

• *Calls for Service Statistics.* In March 2024, the Grand Junction Regional Communications Center logged 917 calls for service for the Fruita Police Department. This compares with 849 calls for service in March 2023, showing an 8% increase. Year to date, we are at 2,937 calls for service in 2024 compared with 2,654 this time last year, showing an 11% increase.

Public Works

- Congratulations Jesse! Congratulations to Jesse McClaskey on his promotion to Streets Crew
 Leader. Jesse has several years of experience as an equipment operator completing road
 maintenance projects and installing critical infrastructure. Jesse holds a CDL-A License and a
 Wastewater Collection II License. He is certified as a Traffic Control Supervisor and completed
 the APWA Supervisor Training program. Congratulations Jesse!
- City of Fruita Colorado Water Rights. The City filed an application in March of 2023 requesting the Colorado River conditional water rights be continued in full force and effect at the Fruita Pump Station. These water rights were decreed for 25 c.f.s. with 0.78 c.f.s. of that conditional water right absolute and continued the remaining 24.22 c.f.s. conditional. This water right is decreed for municipal and irrigation purposes. The City received the final decree entered by the water judge confirming the city's Colorado River rights for another six years. Future diligence will be filed in April of 2030.
- APWA Conference. Streets Crew participated in the American Public Works Association (APWA)
 Spring Street Conference held in Grand Junction. Agenda topics included: Asphalt Industry
 update and current trends, traffic Control and MUTCD Update, Public Works Support in Wildfire
 Response, Cost of Building Roads, Pavement Preservation and Overlay Solutions, Pavement
 Maintenance, Flagger Certification, etc.
- *Chip Seal Bids.* Chip seal bids are due April 26, 2024, by 1:00 p.m. with bid opening to occur immediately following.
- Utilities. Utility staff cleaned approximately 2,215 feet of sewer lines and is preparing for irrigation start-up on Monday, April 15, 2024. Staff also completed CCTV inspections for Rose Creek
- Kingsview Lift Station Replacement Project. Public Works received 60% design documents for the Kingsview Lift Station project.
