The 3rd Annual Fruita Spring Clean-Up is tomorrow, Saturday, April 20, 2024, from 8:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. at the Public Works Facility located at 900 Kiefer Ave. *Please note the items we CANNOT accept:* Aerosol cans, air conditioners, air/gas cylinders, ammunition, antifreeze, asbestos materials, asphalt rubble, batteries, auto batteries, concrete rubble, electronics, engines/motors, fluorescent lights, freezers, freon, fuel tanks, gasoline/grease/oil, hazardous waste, insecticides, items longer than 6', large drums, liquids of any kind, major appliances, medical waste, microwaves, paint/stain, pesticides, refrigerators, road flares, shingles, spa/pool chemicals, tires. Mattresses and box springs can be dropped off for \$18.00 each. Cash or check will be accepted.

- Question: Should residents on City irrigation not water on Monday because of regular maintenance?
- Answer: We recommend that residents do not water on Mondays since City crews use this day
 of the week to conduct maintenance on the system.

General Updates

- Draft February Financial Reports. The Financial Reports for February sales tax collections will be
 included in the packet for the next regular City Council meeting, but here is an overview of the
 reports:
 - City Sales Taxes In February, City sales tax collections increased 2% compared to the prior year and is trending an increase of 6% overall.
 - Use Taxes on Motor Vehicles Were up 22% in February, at an increase of 7% overall through the first two months of the year.
 - Use Taxes on Building Materials Were down 70% in February, trending at a decrease of 18%.
 - City Lodging Taxes Were down 33% in February, are down 13% overall from the prior year.
 - County Sales Taxes Continued at an increase of 5% through February and is at 5% year-to-date.
- Western Colorado Economic Summit. On Tuesday, Mayor Breman and Councilmembers Miller, Purser, and Kreie and I attended the summit. Mayor Breman represented Fruita well with other elected officials across the valley on economic development in Fruita and regional collaborations.



• CCCMA Annual Conference. This week, Shannon and I attended the annual Colorado City/County Management Association Conference. We went to a variety of sessions and heard from speakers on how to better engage communities, how to access housing funding from Proposition 123 and from the Department of Local Affairs (DOLA), how other organizations are developing internal leadership training for employees on a budget, an economic development report for the state and the country as a whole, and more. This conference is also a great opportunity to meet with our regional and statewide partners and discuss similar projects that we are all working on. I was also able to participate on a panel on supporting mental health in the workplace, highlighting the work of our Wellness Committee and other cultural, support, and educational efforts.

Fruita Academy Week #2. Yesterday, we hosted the second week of the Fruita Academy. The
night started with a tour of the Wastewater Treatment Facility followed by presentations from
the Public Works Department and the Engineering Department.





- Waste Management Monthly Report. In March, Fruita residents recycled 41 tons of bottles, cans, paper, and cardboard. Great job Fruita! The full report can be found below.
- **Senator Hickenlooper Listening Session.** Senator Hickenlooper will be hosting a listening session in Grand Junction on Monday, April 22, 2024, at 5:30 p.m. to gather feedback regarding the proposed Dolores Canyons National Monument. The event is open to the public but an RSVP is required. Register for the event.

Engineering

- **16 Road Construction.** From April 20 23, 16 Road will be closed for railroad work. Please use 15 1/2 road to access the south side of 16 road.
- **19 Road Project.** On Monday, the bid for the 19 Road construction opened and we are accepting bids and proposals until May 10, 2024.

Marketing and Promotion

• **UTMB Desert Rats Trailing Running Festival Recap.** It was a beautiful weekend for the Desert Rats Trail Running Festival here in Fruita! Although we will receive official numbers soon, it is estimated that over 1,600 runners participated in the four events ranging that included 100k, 50k, 25k, and a 10k. The City of Fruita played an active role in permitting the event and assisting in set up and breakdown.

Parks and Recreation

- **Reed Park Update.** The playground installation is complete, including all safety surfacing. This is an active construction site, and we ask you to please wait for the park to open before using the playground. Wheelpark rough grade has begun, and American Ramp Company is starting to prep for concrete. The north shelter foundation and concrete will begin early next week.
- Bark Park Amenities. The Bark Park will be receiving new benches, fire hydrants, leash posts, and dog park agility features. Crews have been working hard to install them and hope to have them completed today. There may be some closures over the weekend but the park will be fully open by next week.
- Youth Scholarship Golf Tournament Recap. Last Friday, we hosted the annual Youth Scholarship Golf Tournament. We had 62 players and raised \$9,700 for our youth scholarship program.
- **Downtown Restroom Construction started this week.** The contractor is completing the site prep for the building and should be ready for delivery mid to late next week. We will be working with the manufacturer to schedule a delivery date for the restroom facility. The bus stop concrete pad will be installed in front of the Fruita Area Chamber of Commerce today.
- **Community Center Waterslide Update.** The contractor will begin underground plumbing for the waterslide next week. There will be some core drilling taking place on Monday and it may be a little noisy in the pool area, but it won't require any closures.
