Downtown Restrooms Now Open

Wednesday afternoon, the downtown restrooms opened for use! The restrooms are on the corner of Peach Street and Aspen Avenue. There are two units, with ADA accessibility, and changing stations. The restrooms are currently scheduled to open at 6 a.m. each day and lock at 11 p.m. each night, and they are self-cleaning. We answered a few common questions we've been seeing from the community on our social media accounts. Please be patient as we make small changes and adjustments to the automated features until we get the restrooms dialed in and operating optimally.

Riverfront Trail near Loma

Due to rising water levels in the Colorado River from snow melt, the Riverfront Trail near Loma at Reed Wash is closed. We will share an update on our social media accounts once the trail is back open.

Weekly FAQ

- Question: Does the City of Fruita have an ordinance on maintaining weeds on property?
- Answer: Yes, and here are a few helpful guidelines to ensure your property (residential and/or business) is following the City of Fruita's code: Cut all weeds that are 12 inches in height or higher to the ground and remove them for your property. Remove all weeds on your property starting at the curb of the sidewalk/street. If your property is in junction with an alley way, please clear weeds starting at the center point of the alley. General Updates

- 169 S. Mulberry Closing. This morning, we closed on the sale of 169 S. Mulberry Street. This closing also includes a parking agreement, development agreement, encroachment agreement and a financial guarantee to ensure the improvements within the development agreement will be completed. The new owners, who also own FARM, will present an overview to the City Council of their plans for the building and its future use on June 4. Excited for this redevelopment, which will also yield a City-owned public parking lot.
- City Manager Engagement Event. Join City Manager Mike Bennett and guests on Thursday, May 30 at 5:15 p.m. at Copper Club Brewery (153 N. Mulberry St.) for casual conversations. These events are an opportunity for residents to have an open conversation with the City Manager and discuss the topics on their minds while exploring Fruita or enjoying a local business. These are casual, informal events that all are welcome to attend and drop in or out of at any time. (Please note this date was changed from June 11 to May 30).
- Mesa County Mental Health Services Survey. Mesa County is inviting all residents to participate
 in a Mental Health Community Assessment survey, which will run until June 3, 2024, to gather
 insights on the current state of mental health services and identify areas for improvement.

- *CML Spring Meeting.* Last night, Councilors Miller and Purser, and Shannon and I, attended the Spring regional meeting for the Colorado Municipal League. The bulk of the meeting was spent on hearing updates from our regional partners, along with hearing a recap of the legislative session from CML, looking at 2024 statewide ballot measures, and reviewing CML resources. These meetings are a great chance for elected officials and staff to catch up with one another and receive training and updates from the CML staff. The next meeting will be this fall in Grand Junction.
- Reminder from CDOT on Summer Traffic Season. The latest newsletter from the Colorado
 Department of Transportation (CDOT) is focused on preparing travelers for summer and where
 to anticipate additional traffic throughout the state. If you are interested in reading the

Engineering

- *Electric Poles on Ottley Avenue.* During the City Council meeting on Tuesday night, there was a question about the construction along Ottley Avenue for new electric poles. The new electric poles being installed are to support the new solar panel farm just the northeast of Rim Rock Elementary School.
- *Pine Street Construction.* The intersection at Pine Street and Wildwood Drive was closed for utility improvements for the Gear Estates development from May 21 until today. The road will be open with slow speeds from Friday, May 24 Monday, May 27. The road will then close again to finish up the project from Tuesday, May 28 Friday, May 31. The recommended detour is taking L Road and K 4/10 Road to 18 1/2 Road.

Parks and Recreation

- Reed Park Update. The Northern Pavilion footers have been poured and prep for the slab, flatwork, and ADA ramp has begun. The northern pavilion will be delivered and installed later next week. The wheel park will have flatwork poured this week and a representative from Action Sports Design will be on site to check on the progress. The stormwater vault has been installed and sump pump was installed on Thursday. The landscaping contractor has repaired most of the irrigation but is still having issues with zone 5. They will be working on those repairs to make sure the park is irrigated. They will also be backfilling trenches that have settled and prepare for area for sod. The electrician will be on site to pull wire from the transformer to the building and prepare all electrical work.
- **Community Center Waterslide Update.** Concrete has been poured in the mechanical room and maintenance can move back into the building. The contractor started excavation for the tower foundations outside of the building. Progress is still on track.
- Parks Irrigation Update Continued. The parks crew has been working to get all irrigation turned on in parks. The high water has now created issues with sediment and debris in the water clogging filters nightly.
- Hot 90 Days of Summer Membership. This first-ever FREE summer pass program was implemented in May at the Fruita Community Center. Staff cultivated this program after a

donation was received from a Western Slope organization. The donor requested funds be utilized to grant free access to as many youth 17 and under as possible. Using shared resources, the Fruita Parks and Recreation Department offered 45 Child Passes and 52 Youth Passes totaling 97 Memberships to Fruita locals.
