Tuesday's City Council Meeting

We have a busy City Council meeting next week! Our meeting will begin with eight proclamations and presentations. These include: (1) Recognizing the students and teachers of the month at Monument Ridge Elementary; (2) a proclamation recognizing the Fruita Monument Boys Basketball Team on a very successful season; (3) a proclamation for Teacher Appreciation Week; (4) a proclamation for Police Week; (5) a proclamation for National Public Works Week; (6) a proclamation for the Days of Remembrance; (7) recognizing the Fruita Academy Graduates; and we will conclude with an update on the Total Daily Maximum Load with Mesa County. After moving on to the consent agenda, we have no public hearings on the agenda. Our administrative agenda includes an update on the Comprehensive Plan, Land Use Code, Strategic Plan, and Circulation Plan, before moving into Council reports and actions. This is the first of several presentations that we will provide on recent Master Plans before as we prepare for strategic plan updates in the future. Finally, for Council reports, the City Council will make appointments to Boards and Commissions, consider cancelling the first meeting in July, and then will conduct the informal review of the Municipal Judge. Fruita Fat Tire Festival, Girls on the Run, and Co2UT This Weekend

It is going to be a busy weekend in Fruita! The Fruita Fat Tire Festival starts tonight in downtown Fruita and at 18 Road, and the Girls on the Run 5K is tomorrow at Shelledy Elementary School. In addition to those, Fishing is Fun is tomorrow and the gravel bike race Colorado 2 Utah (Co2UT) is tomorrow starting at the Fruita Civic Center. Here is more information on the events and potential traffic impacts:

- Fat Tire Festival and Co2UT Will be using Fruita Civic Center Park, the parking lot, and surrounding streets. The races for Co2UT begin early on Saturday, and racers will be heading north on Peach and then Maple Street to access the North Fruita Desert from 18 Road.
- **Girls on the Run** Will be running the same routes as last year, starting at Shelledy Elementary, then heading east on Ottley before heading north on Maple, and then Applewood Drive to Celestine Drive to taking the Big Salt Wash Trail (for behind Comstock) back to Ottley Avenue. We expect there will be traffic delays due to this event around 10:00 a.m.
- **Fishing is Fun Saturday, May 4**th **from 9am-11am at Snooks Bottom.** Registration is required; however, the event is free!

General Updates

• Fruita Academy Week #4. Thursday was our last night of this year's Fruita Academy, and we look forward to celebrating our graduates next week! Mayor Breman and I discussed the role of elected officials, boards and commissions, the form of government, key parts of our strategic plan, long term goals, and more. Ciara then covered the City's communication efforts and how residents can stay up to date with Fruita news. Shannon wrapped up the Fruita Academy with

- providing participants with an overview of the Administration Department and the City's budget. This was a great group of residents, and we want to thank them for their participation this year. Thank you!
- **FEMA PIO Training.** This week, Communications and Engagement Manager Ciara Amann and Communications and Marketing Coordinator Ammon Pierce attended Public Information Officer training provided by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) in Grand Junction. This in-depth training is designed to provide communications staff with the essential knowledge, skills, and abilities to support proper decision-making by delivering the right message to the right people, at the right time at all levels of government.
- Spring Colorado Municipal League Meeting. The spring district 11 meeting for the Colorado Municipal League is scheduled for Wednesday, May 22, 2024, at 5:00 p.m. in Palisade. If you would like to attend, please let Jennifer and I know, and we will get you registered. These meetings are an update to hear from each community, hear a recap from CML on the recent legislative session, and to get together with other staff and elected from Mesa County.
- Congressional Directed Spending. This week, we applied for Congressional Directed Spending
 for the downtown Sewer Line replacements through Representative Boebert. This is the same
 request that we submitted to both Senators Bennet and Hickenlooper in March. We received
 notice late last week that the Congresswoman would be accepting requests, and we were able
 to meet the Thursday deadline for submission.
- Mesa County Libraries Survey. The Mesa County Library is looking for community feedback and
 we want to invite the Fruita community to participate in their 2024 Community Survey, which
 will be crucial in shaping their future direction. After completing the survey, you will be entered

- Fruita Bike to Work Day Recap. Fruita bike to work day was a great kick off for Grand Valley Bike Month. The smell of coffee, fresh bagels and muffins filled the crisp morning air as the sun rose. We had some early risers who teach in Loma show up first who fueled up on bagels and coffee for their long bike in to work. Shortly after the Loma crew left, we had our Fruita Middle school students, teachers and family members who swiftly dug into the muffins, bagels, coffee and juices. After everyone ate, they pedaled their way to work and school. Thanks to everyone who came out and joined us for the kickoff to bike week. Engineering

- 16 Road Update. The railroad crossing at 16 Road is paved and is back open to the public. Staff are working on getting a bid package out for the next phase of the project with a tentative bid date of June 7th. There will be a long delay between the bud date and the project's completion (widening and stripping improvements near the railroad crossing) due to the railroad's permitting process.
- 19 Road Update. We hosted a pre-bid meeting this week for the 19 Road project that was very well attended. The bid date is scheduled for May 10.

Parks and Recreation

- **Downtown Restroom Construction Update.** Temporary power was installed on Wednesday to prepare for the restroom's delivery. The building is being prepared for transit and will be arriving on May 13th. It will take two days to complete the installation with training on the last day. Once the building is installed concrete will be poured to complete the project.
- **Parks Irrigation Update.** The parks crews have been working to get all irrigation turned on in parks. Little Salt Wash and Civic Center have underground electrical issues preventing the systems from running from the irrigation clock. Crews are also troubleshooting issues at Olga

- Anson and Comstock and hope to get these issues fixed to get water on the turf as soon as possible.
- **Community Center Waterslide Update.** The waterslide plumbing is almost complete and currently working on foundation support. There is a stormwater pipe that must be relocated outside of the building, and we are working on plans to relocate.
- **Community Center Video Service in workout areas.** The FCC has installed new DirectTV equipment in the fitness area and on cardio cinema equipment. This will provide more viewing options while working out.
- Aquatics Staff Update. Our newest full-time member of staff started on Monday, April 29. Riley Ceglowski is now the Aquatics Coordinator for the FCC and is looking forward to jumping into the summer with the other staff members and community here in Fruita!
- Community Center Visitation Numbers. Continuing to follow an upward trend of increased visitation, the FCC hosted over 16,000 guests and patrons in April. This is 1,500 more visitors than this time last year and almost 7,000 more total visitors for the year. This includes 378 City of Fruita Employee visits in April. The FCC strives to be a place that our the community and our co-workers find recreation and leisure opportunities.
- Reed Park Update. The Northern Pavilion footers will be poured Tuesday next week and then prepping for the slab, flatwork, and ADA ramp will take place after that is completed. Mays Concrete will pour the slab Friday May 10th and the following Monday pour the flatwork. Currently working on pricing for the changes at the North Pavilion. The wheelpark is progressing with forms, fine grading, and rebar for the mini bowl, brick stamp area, and staircase (pictured below). The tongue and groove started this week, all wood has been stained, roof was completed, doors painted, and drywall started. The landscaping contractor is still fixing all damaged irrigation and splicing damaged irrigation wires. They are working to get all repairs made so they can start irrigating the park.

Public Works

- *Utilities Update.* The city irrigation system is on with only maintenance/user valve repairs continuing. Staff completed about 9,500 ft. of sewer line cleaning and an estimated 3,800 ft. of CCTV inspections of sewer lines in April.
- **Road Maintenance Update.** Streets Division completed an asphalt patch on N. Apple St., continued painting parking stalls downtown and continues with crack sealing. Staff completed 189 locates for April and 86 miles of street striping.
- Mesa County Storm Drain Art Project. The City of Fruita is participating in the Mesa County Storm Drain Art Project that is a public-private art initiative meant to raise awareness at storm drain inlets. Local artists are invited to submit designs that will include stormwater pollution prevention concepts; aquatics, wildlife, riparian habitat concepts; or quality of life concepts.
